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HOME GARMENT MAKING. The Bulletin's Pattern Service.

Developed in fine muslin, cambric or lace, this is a delightful little undergarment to wear under the dress of the present style.

The pattern is in eight sizes—32 to 46 inches bust measure. For 36 bust the combination requires 5/8 yards of material 36 inches wide or 2 1/2 yards 42 inches wide, each with 4 1/2 yards of edging 5 inches wide for ruffles, 1 1/2 yards of binding, 2 yards of ribbon and 1/4 yard of narrow edging to trim. Be sure to give accurate measurements. Price, 10 cents.

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
