BUYING RIGHT OF WAY.

Westchester Northern Closing Details in Ridgefield.

The Westchester Northern railroad, which is to connect the city of New York city by way of White Plains, N. Y., is completing the land purchases for its right of way in the neighborhood of Ridgefield as rapidly as possible. A number of deals for land required for the line have recently been closed during last week. One of the most important purchases made in Ridgefield is said to have been that of the property of H. J. Kellogg, just below the cemetery. The road has bought the property of Mr. Kellogg at that point. Mr. Kellogg said, when asked if the road had secured his property, that the deal had been concluded and that it was probable that he would be called upon to vacate the land in Ridgefield. He said that he had sold the property of Hiram Stevens, of Ridgefield, has also been purchased. It is said in Ridgefield that the railroad has been made to bind the contracts for such land as has been purchased.

The road is said to be adopting a liberal policy with landholders and in the majority of cases, where there has been little difficulty in reaching mutually satisfactory terms. There are several cases, however, in which the railroad will either make changes in its route in order to avoid property that is held at high value, or to take the matter to the courts for condemnation proceedings.—Danbury News.
