WESTERY DAILY

Getting Evidence in Whiskey Poisoning Cases—Plans for New Welch Laiding—Herman G. Bradford Returns After 45 Years—John McAvoy's Death Resulted from Natural Causes—Lobster Law Off.

Town Solicitor Agard, Chief Branfield and the police department have been collecting evidence in substantiation of the charges that given by Coroner Brown, in the whiskey poisoning cases, and will present the case to the grand jury, which convenes at the superior court session in Kingston, Monday, where Attorney General Greenough, in behalf of the state, will give the circumstances in the case personal attention. Should the evidence warrant an indictment of some nature will be brought against the party or parties who are believed to have violated the law.

Town Solicitor Harry B. Agard made the statement: We have, of course, will, summon all who know anything of value about the case. It is the general procedure in cases of this kind to place the evidence before the grand jury and they can decide what it is, whether it is a case of simple poisoning, manslaughter, homicide, or if any degree of murder.

The grand jury represents the people and is composed of twenty-three men selected from all sections of Washington county. They will have the best legal instruction from the judge of the superior court and of the attorney general of the state. In any event the case would have to be put up to the grand jury, together with all the evidence in the case, and possession, even if complaint were made against any individual or individuals, so it is a saving of time and a safe way to take the whole matter immediately to the grand jury. They have at their command the power to subpoena and order a thorough investigation and there is no doubt that everything possible will be done to get at the actual facts.

Mr. Agard said he did not know just what will be done by the Connecticut authorities in connection with the deaths that occurred in Pawcatuck, as he was not thoroughly familiar with the procedure in such cases in that state. He said, however, that "Coroner Brown had investigated the cases and will probably report his findings to Prosecutor Hinkley of Stonington, who in turn will place the facts before the grand jury in Rhode Island, and the attendant action in Rhode Island are made known to the grand jury by State Attorney Hull, after he becomes familiar with the facts as officially presented."

Plans are nearly completed for the new brick building to be erected on Broad street by James A. Welch. The building is to be of brick three stories in height, with ornamental front. The first floor is to contain stores and Mr. Welch's stable office, the second floor is to be fitted for offices and the third floor apartments. The plan is so arranged that it can be extended to the Union street front. Mr. Welch desires to remove the corner house, without interfering with the general architectural design.

The plan also admits the erection of apartment houses in Union street front, which will probably be decided upon by the city council. Work will soon be commenced on the building that is to face Broad street, but the work of building on Union street will be deferred until the matter of changing the grade of that street is definitely determined.
