The Berlin Agricultural society has decided to issue agricultural bulletins during the summer months, beginning the first of May. The Connecticut Sheep Breeders' association is to hold its annual field meeting and sheep-shearing contest Thursday, May 5, at Mountain Spring farm, Farmington, upon invitation of the owner, Charles M. Supreme Court in Session Here Today. Number of Cases Are Ready for Argument and Will Be Heard.

Pitcher vs. Christ Church corporation, state vs. Paatz, and Sherwood G. Avery vs. Charles White.

LICENSING OF DOGS. Town Clerk Has 675 on His Books. Thus Far, with 1,300 More to Come Within Five Days.

Thus far this month Dog Warden Stanton has shot nine dogs and has one more in the pound. He is anticipating a big harvest next month, as the indications are that there will be a large number of unlicensed dogs, and that the owners must pay more interest in the protection of the lives of their dogs.

Town Clerk Folger has thus far issued licenses to but 675, indicating that there are 1,300 more which must be registered within the next five days as the law requires that they shall be licensed and tagged by the first of May, which is Sunday. He hopes to get them all in, he will be obliged to license them at the rate of 250 a day for the rest of the week.

How Noble Through Head with Rifle

Noble A. Ladd of Franklin Stood Before Mirror as He Took His Life at His Home—Result of Morbid Condition of Mind and Body.

Noble Austin Ladd, 61 years old, and for nearly all his life a resident of Franklin, committed suicide at his home in this town Monday afternoon about 2 o'clock. Standing in front of a mirror, he placed the muzzle of a rifle against his forehead and pressed the trigger, and the bullet ploughed its way up through his forehead and head.

Monday afternoon, and although he tried several times to call Mr. Ladd, he received no answer. He stepped into the house and there, in his bedroom on the first floor, lying in a pool of blood, he found the body of Noble Ladd. His father was at that time already cold when found by Mr. James.

Industrial Home Has Been Opened Here. Salvation Army Adds New Feature to the Work Here, Opening in Thames Street.

There was opened at 13 Thames street on Monday an industrial home conducted by the Salvation Army. The industrial department is a re-education of the unemployed, and the work is being done in a building which was formerly a school.

Washington, D. C. April 25.—The senate in executive session this afternoon confirmed the nomination by President Taft of Louis J. Fontaine of Baltimore, Conn., as postmaster in that city.

COMMISSION NAMED FOR WEST SIDE WALKS. Judge Greene Selects A. L. Potter, John C. Morgan and Fred C. Crowell to Decide on Value.

Judge Greene on Saturday named the commission to hear the claims regarding the taking of land for the widening of West Main street west of the fire station. A previous committee awarded the three property owners, with whom the city would not come to terms the sums of \$250 in two instances and \$175 in the third.

Two Divorces from South End of County Have Been Brought.

Wheeler of North Stonington for a divorce claiming intolerable cruelty between May 1, 1907, and May 1, 1909, also that between June 1, 1899, and June 1, 1900, she committed adultery at Wheeling, W. Va., with Richard Green, and between February 1, 1909, and April 7, 1910, with John Doe in North Stonington.

Hyman Cohen of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., sues Mendell Weltman of Colchester for judgment in Colechester and damages of \$200, it being claimed that the defendant has wrongfully disposed of the plaintiff's 48 acres of land, depriving him of rents and profits of land amounting to \$200 a year.

French Stability. The present French republic has now lasted about 40 years—much longer than any form of government in the Bourbons was interrupted by the great revolution. All the different forms of government prevalent in France from 1789 till Napoleon got control, taken together, lasted about 11 years.
