ELDER AMASA MORSE Will Be 96 Years Old on Sunday, May 8.

Elder Amasa Morse this week will be 96 years old. The World's Crisis, published by the Methodist Christian Publication society contains the following article in the current issue:

On Sunday, May 8, Elder Amasa Morse of Stafford Springs will be 96 years of age. This means that he was born May 8, 1814, or in the midst of the second and last year between the United States and Great Britain. During the very month in which he was born—which was a few days after Napoleon left France, arriving at Elba, May 4, or May 29, Empress Josephine died, and on May 20 the peace of Paris was signed, on one side by France and on the other by Great Britain, Russia, Austria and Prussia.

When the battle of Waterloo was fought on June 18, 1815, Brother Morse was one year, one month and ten days old. When Napoleon died at St. Helena he lacked only three days of being seven years old. When the Miller movement in this country was at its height, in 1843, he was almost 30 years of age.

What a span for one life. And the good man is still with us. An Adventist preacher through more than sixty years, Brother Morse is now the oldest representative of the early
