Westerly Building Guttled By Fire

Barber Memorial Block Practically Destroyed—Loss Estimated at Over \$50,000—Fire District Committee's Report Accepted and Recommendations Adopted—Prohibition Party Nominates Ticket—Coast Artillery Drill Apparatized to be Installed This Week—Effort to Get Bulkeley Team to play Westery Friday.

The Barber Memorial building on High street was gutted by fire Wednesday night and the loss both to building and contents, it is estimated, will amount to considerably over \$50,000, possibly over \$100,000. The blaze started in the Masonic hall on the top floor, in a small room where the electric light wires enter the building. Crossed wires, it is thought, caused the fire. The flames spread rapidly, and the roof of the building was burned almost entirely off. It was covered with tin and this was an obstacle in the way of the firemen. They did excellent work, however, and by one o'clock the morning it was thought that they were beginning to get the fire under control.

About 10:30, James Coleman, the janitor of Masonic hall, was coming out of the Odd Fellows' hall in the next block in the smoke and notified Chief of Police Bransfield, who at about 10:35 o'clock turned in an alarm from box 36. A general alarm was sounded when the extent of the fire was discovered and the three Westery companies and the three companies of Pawtucket responded. The two engines were soon pouring streams into the roaring furnace. The flames burst through the roof and leaped high in the air, and made a vivid spectacle, that attracted a large crowd of onlookers.

The fire had secured a good start when the fire companies arrived, and for the first hour and a half it seemed as if the whole building were doomed. Gradually, however, the fighters succeeded in gaining an advantage and at 1:30 o'clock the fire was under control. On the top floor of the building, which is three stories high in front, which is three stories high in front, and is valued at about \$50,000, was the Masonic hall, all of which was destroyed.

The Masonic rooms were occupied by Franklin lodge, No. 29, A. F. and M. lodge, No. 30, A. F. and M. lodge, No. 28, R. A. M. Narragansett commandery, No. 27, K. T. Debonair chapter, Eastern Star. One hundred and twenty uniformed men in lockers in the hall and their regalia presented to the Masonic lodge by Westery quillies, and other things that are on the roof were saved. The Masons carried insurance, however, on their property.

The damage to the two lower floors was all destroyed. On the second floor are the Westery water works office, Judge Williams' law office, the Third district court room, the Maxon Printing Press Co.'s office, the Christian Science reading room, Dr. J. H. Chapman's dental parlor, Dr. Colby's office, the Mechanics' Savings bank. On the first floor are W. H. Joslin's grocery store, A. L. Castiglia's jewelry store, George Kingsley's grocery store, William H. Browning's dry goods store.

The Barber building is owned by Miss Matilda Babcock of Pawtucket. It is valued at about \$50,000 and is underwritten by the fully covered by insurance.

eral Agent James N. Smith reported that during the year attention had been given to 286 animals and that five cases had been prosecuted in the district court and 74 persons were admonished for various offenses. At the annual meeting of the Rhode Island Knights of Columbus Judge John W. Sweeney of Westery was re-elected judge advocate. The total membership of the order in the state May 1, 1910, was 2,838. The order has been in Rhode Island twenty-five years, the pioneer council being Narragansett of Westery, and \$215,000 have been paid in benefits during that time, and the insurance carried by members in this state amounts to \$2,174,990.

Mr. Cathcart presented a resolution that the nominating committee of the conference be authorized to name an industrial committee, which was adopted. The idea of the industrial committee is for the consideration of the great industrial problems of the day.
