NORWICH MAY BE DISAPPOINTED

Remored that the Census will Fall Short of 30,000—Many Have Been Skipped in Other Cities, but None Here as far as Known—Hartford Had 1 wo Blocks Missed.

Much complaint is being made about the state regarding the unsatisfactory result of the census recently taken, and not yet fully completed in this state. In several of the cities it is found that there have been many persons skipped, entire families have been overlooked and in one city two blocks were omitted by a woman enumerator. Two special agents have been sent about in many of the larger cities, looking for any omissions.

New London Stung. In New London there have been many who were not secured by the enumerators and in Stonington a prominent official not only townwise but known throughout the county and state, says that the enumerator did not get him. Putnam has been making inquiries about their situation, while the worst situation has developed in Hartford where, it is claimed, the census will not show 100,000, while they have been claiming 112,000. Two entire blocks were missed there by a woman enumerator.

The census enumerators have been forbidden to give out the results, so it is not known what the result will be in this city. However, it is said that the results will be unsatisfactory and that the population will not come up to what it has been thought it would. No figures have been given out but it is known the city and town have grown and 30,000 was the amount anticipated. It is reported though not officially that it will fall considerably short of that.

Send Your Name to Bulletin. At the request of Supervisor Bailey notices have been printed by The Bulletin asking any who was skipped heretofore to send their names to him. How many have been skipped and done this is not known, but to forestall such a situation as in Hartford, if any who were not placed on the list by any enumerator will send their names and address to The Bulletin, at once, it will be seen that they are included in the census. Everyone should be in, as Norwich wants to make its best showing.

The situation in Hartford resulted in Supervisor Bailey sending special representatives there and finally in his personal visit there on Friday. Hartford Situation. When seen Friday morning regarding the Hartford situation, Professor Bailey said: "Of course you know that the census has been making a 'clean sweep' throughout the state and have by every manner and means available tried to get those names which we surely

must have missed in the larger cities especially. We have advertised the fact that we would be thankful to receive the names and addresses of anyone who had not been enumerated. That advertising campaign we have carried on through the newspapers, postoffice, board of trades and other organizations through which we might attain the results desired—a complete census. "In the city of Hartford during the past week we have conducted a sort of special 'clean-up' with a view to making a final report for that city. We asked in that city as we have done in other places, the hearty and earnest co-operation of everyone especially the newspapers. The response was quite general. A day or two ago Inspector Lawson, who was in charge of the work, after making comparisons, discovered that two sections of a triangular block were missed. The matter was immediately remedied before the discovery was made by the newspapers. "This is the only case of its kind reported and the number, 30 names, is insignificant. I am surprised indeed to think that we have overlooked. Many of the city of Hartford and not found more than 150 people unenumerated from all sources. We expected to discover about 500 such cases. The yield from our final canvass was as small as it is indicates the thoroughness of the work of the enumerators. "The campaign will not close until next week when Bridgeport and Waterbury will be put through the clean-up process and meanwhile we welcome all kinds of publicity that makes for a thorough census. "The work of enumeration is completed in all the cities of the state and all the farming districts with the exception of Stratford, Woodbridge, Greenwich and Ashford, each of which has taken an extra ten days. "Professor Bailey explained that it was not permissible to give out the total population of this state or any of the cities. He asserted, however, that the probable results has stirred up the citizens of many places.

Putnam Remonstrated. The thought that one's town did not increase in population according to expectations has stirred up pride in more than one place. He cited the case of a remonstrance from Putnam because the census yield did not prove satisfactory to them and by way of investigation the enumerators in Putnam received personal letters. They all replied, "We can take them, but not make them."

Supervisor Bailey said that the number of vacant apartments found in Hartford was three times as great as in New Haven. He showed a large list of cards bearing these apartments and how the enumerators had made repeated calls to make sure of the vacancies before their work should close. While the supervisor is not allowed to give even an estimate of what the enumeration will be, it is learned, however, that the enumeration in Hartford will be less than 100,000.

PERMISSION GIVEN ORGANIZATIONS TO PARADE. Flags on Armories Will Be at Half-Mast Memorial Day.

Adjutant General Cole has issued the following order regarding Memorial Day: Memorial day, the most hallowed holiday in our national calendar, quickens the hearts of the living and merits the tribute of flowers that decorate the graves of the illustrious dead. It has been organized and followed the differences of opinion in the past and we only remember the chivalry and bravery of those who fought and died. A little more than a decade since, brethren of the north and south fought valiantly side by side in a foreign land to relieve the oppressed, and what this nation can do united was abundantly proven, by such success, as had no parallel in the recorded annals of humanity. To the organized militia, Memorial day conveys the lesson that the preservation of the Union is the common glory, the common benefit, and a common heritage of every true soldier and patriot.

As a mark of respect it is therefore ordered that the national flag be displayed May 30, 1910, at the state arsenal and armory, state armories and soldiers' home at Noroton, at half-staff from sunrise until midday; at noon the flag will be hoisted to the top of the staff and remain there until sunset. Permission is also granted for organizations to parade under arms on that date.
