IN AND ABOUT WESTERY

Highway to Watch Hill to be Speedily Improved—Death of Mrs. Rose E. Truell—Twins on Jury in United States Court—Funeral of Dr. E. H. Knowles—Band Concert.

The delay in the commencement of the rebuilding of the Pawcatuck Valley street railway between Westery and Watch Hill is liable to not only interfere with trolley business during the summer months, but also with automobiles and other traffic. Six weeks ago representatives of the town council of Westery for certain privileges in regard to slight changes in layout and grade with the understanding that the road would be rebuilt and fully equipped by June 15, the trolley sidewalks have been laid, the roadway stock had been purchased and the men and material were then in readiness to commence the work without delay.

At Watch Hill proper, at Bay street and the approach thereto, where new sidewalks have been laid, the road is in almost impassable condition, as at this point a change in grade and location of rails is to be made to accommodate the trolley company. If the condition is permitted to exist much longer, or even if the main thoroughfare to the hill is to be cut out of repair during the summer months, there will be tendency to impair the success of the summer season at Watch Hill. The highway committee has determined to make a move in this matter and ascertain the definite intention of the trolley company and will be governed in action by the information received.

It is something out of the ordinary for two brothers, especially twins, to be summoned as grand jurors to the United States district court, but that is what happened to Henry and William Burk of Westery, who went to Providence Thursday afternoon. These twins are so much alike that their presence may be confusing to the court officers, in case the one is sent to the jury room and the other excused from a special panel. Arrangements are completed for the annual inspection and parade of the Westery fire department. The order of procession will be as follows: Platoon of Police, Westery Brass Band, Charles O. Gavitt, leader, Chief Engineer Samuel G. Cottrell and Assistants, Westery Fire Police, Alert Hook and Ladder Company, No. 1, George Capron, foreman, Cyclone Steam Fire Engine Company, No. 2, John Lynch, foreman, Rhode Island Steam Fire Engine Company, No. 1, Charles Fountain, foreman.

All the fire apparatus of the department will be in proper place in the Westery fire department. The Dixon square at 2 o'clock, right resting on Elm street, and move over the following line of march: counter-march to Main street, down Main street, to Cross street, to Elm, to Granite, to Grove avenue, to Pleasant, to Canal, to Dixon square. Here the firemen and apparatus will be inspected by Chief Samuel G. Cottrell and the board of engineers, after which the parade will be dismissed.
