FIREMEN'S DAY IN WESTERY

Crowd Witnesses Annual Parade Following Inspection—Sudden Death of Lewis F. Greene—Westery Team Defeats Wakefield 9 to 6—White Rock 3, Stonington 2—Postmaster Price Critically Ill.

Saturday was Firemen's day in Westery and the annual inspection and parade of the department attracted not only the townspeople but many visitors from adjacent places, including a few from New London and Norwich interested in the firemen. The three companies composing the department were in neat uniform and the apparatus, two steam fire engines, two horse-drawn modern hose wagons and a hook and ladder truck with new set of ladders, showed a well equipped fire district. The procession was formed in Broad street and moved over the customary line of march in this order: Platoon of police, Chief Cornelius Bransfield; Westery band, 24 men, leader, Charles O. Gavitt; Westery fire police, Capt. John M. Himes; board of engineers, Chief Samuel G. Cottrill; David Robertson, Harry S. Coyte, William H. Greene; Alert hook and ladder company, 36 men, Capt. George E. Capron, Fire Asst. Richard Mitchell, Second Asst. Henry Potter, Secretary Albert T. Kenneth, Treasurer William St. Onge; Cyrene steam fire engine company, No. 2, 28 men, Capt. John Lynch, Fire Asst. George W. White; Cyrene hook and ladder, Capt. H. Hill, Secretary Samuel M. Sharpe; Treasurer James McCarroll, Rhode Island steam fire engine company, No. 1, Fire Asst. Christopher F. Fontaine, Fire Asst. Nelson W. Himes, Second Asst. Arthur Burdick, Secretary Howard O. McFarland, Treasurer Elwood Clark.

After marching over the prescribed route the department was reviewed by Chief Cottrill in trusty military style, the band playing "Hail to the Chief" as the man in command rode down the line. After this ceremonial parade was dismissed, and the firemen returned to quarters where they received their friends and enjoyed a social session, which is one of the pleasing features of the fraternal side of a volunteer fire department.

Lewis F. Greene, late of Apponaug, but later a resident of Providence, and known in Westery, died suddenly in Providence Saturday morning. He was sitting in a doorway when a policeman noticed that Mr. Greene was sick and an ambulance was summoned. Mr. Greene dying on the way to the hospital of heart disease. He was former superintendent of a cotton mill in Voluntown and had membership in several lodges of Odd Fellows, and Smith post, No. 45, G. A. R. department of Connecticut. He is survived by four daughters and four sons. Mr. Greene was born in Foster, R. I., 25 years ago and served in the Seventh Rhode Island regiment in the civil war.

Commencement week at the Rhode Island State college at Kingston is an annual attraction of interest to Westery as well as other sections of Rhode Island. A delegation from Westery went to Kingston Sunday, and listened to the baccalaureate sermon by President Howard Edwards, his subject being "The Old Order and the New." In the evening there will be the annual reception to the president and faculty.

The commencement exercises will be held in Lippitt hall, commencing at 11 o'clock in the morning. The exercises will include an address by ex-Gov. George H. Utter of Westery, whose theme will be "Stop a Minute, Gov. Aram J. Pottinger, will also speak and President Edwards will confer the degree. There is a class of seventeen to graduate, the largest in years. In the afternoon there will be a meeting of the alumni association and a baseball game. The commencement exercises will conclude with a ball in the evening.

It was a game that was won in a single inning, in the fourth, when Westery scored eight runs on a batch of bunched hits, although in the total number of hits both clubs evened on the uneven number of 13 each.
