WESTERY BOARD OF TRADE

Holds Final Meeting Until October—Matter of Regulating Fourth of July Fireworks Left to Special Committee—New Members Voted in.

President Charles Perry called the monthly meeting of the Westery Board of Trade to order Tuesday evening. Owing to the presence of Governor Pottier and staff in the village and the near close of election there was a small attendance at the opening, but soon thereafter there was a quorum present. The minutes of the May meeting were read and approved. The secretary read communications from the American Forestry Association and asked the co-operation of the Westery Board of Trade, showing the need of funds for the promotion of the work, and asked the organization to become a sustaining member at a cost of \$25 a year.

ber of Commerce, the Westery Board of Trade sent invitation to the fourth international chambers of commerce and boards of trade, to be held in London, that the fifth conference be held in Boston. All unfinished business was referred to the executive committee for action. The names of Samuel H. Davis and William H. Dennis were submitted for membership and they were elected unanimously. Frank W. Coy spoke in favor of a safe and sane Fourth of July and he understood the intention of the celebration held on that date. He thought it would be well to suggest that the sale of fireworks be prohibited in Westery and that the selection of Stoughton be asked to co-operate. Arthur N. Nash said this was a bad time for such action, as it was unfair to the merchants who had already purchased their stock. To take it up at this late day would be unfair. It did not affect him personally, as he had not sold fireworks for two years. Chairman Perry was in favor of the project, but he believed it too late to take any action at this time, but it was left to the executive committee to take action. The matter was referred to a special committee. The executive committee will be active all summer, hold frequent meetings, and call special meetings of the board if deemed expedient.

GIGANTIC MELON

To Be Cut in Bridgeport for Benefit of Singer Mfg. Company. What is declared to be the biggest melon ever sliced in the financial history of the United States will be cut for the benefit of the Singer Mfg. company, which firm controls the Bridgeport factory formerly owned by the Wheeler & Wilson Mfg. company. The dividend is \$20,000,000, or 100 per cent. of the capital stock, and a portion of this will be divided among stockholders in Bridgeport. The company has called a meeting of directors June 18 to declare a stock dividend of \$20,000,000. The concern is capitalized at \$20,000,000 and the stock dividend just declared is 100 per cent. Although the company has a cash surplus of \$30,000,000, the directors feel that a stock rather than a cash dividend is advisable. Just what amount of this dividend will be divided among the local stockholders in the company is not known, although it is probable that it will reach a considerable figure. When sold to the Singer company four years ago, a handsome profit was realized by some of the Wheeler & Wilson stockholders. The selling price was over \$60 a share, and the total amount was purchased at from \$11 to \$25.
