

CHARLTON MAY ESCAPE TRIAL.

Italian Government Seems Reluctant to Act in the Matter of Extradition.

HELD HERE AS FUGITIVE FROM JUSTICE.

Diplomatic Question as to the Slayer's Extradition—Possibility that Charlton May Walk—For Jail a Free Man—Prisoner Before Sanity Alieists for Nearly Two Hours—Arraigned Before Recorder.

New York, June 24.—Porter Charlton will never be tried for murder in the courts of New Jersey. Whether he be his wife's murderer or not, his inability to stand trial in that state is a matter outside the jurisdiction of the Jersey courts.

The attitude of the Jersey courts, as defined tonight by Prosecutor Pierre Garvan of Hudson county, is this: "The state of New Jersey now holds Charlton merely on the complaint of the Italian consul, pending a request for his extradition. If extradition is not demanded, the courts of this state can take no action."

Thus there is a possibility that Charlton may walk from the jail here without trial, for the trend of despatches from Rome seems to indicate that the Italian government will not at all since demand extradition to Italy of an American subject who has committed a crime within Italian jurisdiction would imperil a cherished Italian precedent.

BUCKETSHOP PROSECUTION.

Millionaire Cells of St. Louis Before U. S. Commission.

New York, June 24.—The charge that the Chicago board of trade, which has described as "the biggest bucketshop in the country," and not the government was the real prosecutor of the alleged bucketshop men arrested recently, was made by Howard Taylor, counsel for Louis A. Cella, the millionaire horseman of St. Louis, as the factor was testified this afternoon before United States Commissioner E. H. Cullen.

Cella was being examined in connection with the indictments found against him, his brother Angelo, and Edward W. Taylor, who is now being run in a bucketshop in Washington. Henry S. Robbins, the government economist, testified that while the Chicago board of trade happened to be the one of his clients, it had nothing to do with the prosecution of the Cella or of the other alleged bucketshop keepers.

Louis Cella denied that he was interested in the alleged bucketshop in Washington, and said he had never set foot on District Columbia soil. He said that his examination he acknowledged that he was connected with the Cella Commission of St. Louis.
