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NORWICH TEAM PLAYS
RINGS AROUND MIDDLETOWN
 Score 11 to 4 at Sachem Park—New Batting Order Produces Good Results.

After losing two games to Middletown in a double header engagement, the Norwich team came back with a victory in the third game of the series, and put over a defeat on Tommy Bannan's boys 11 to 4, scoring more runs at Sachem park than they had in the two games at Middletown put together. About 300 people saw the visitors trimmed by the rejuvenated Norwich team.
 From the way the home team played it looked as if the general shake-up, change in batting order, shifted positions in the infield and new men in the lineup would be productive of a faster and stronger team, although Monday, the new centerfielder, failed to make much of an impression at bat. He had no fielding chances, Middletown was outplayed in all departments. Paddy Duff was the fielding general for the afternoon and played a wide awake game that showed he had plenty of bascule in his little. In the first inning he caught Catcher McCue napping on a passed ball and got away with a steal of third base while the catcher was holding the ball and watching him. McCue threw low and too late to head off Duff, who danced up the line till he got half way to third and then made a sudden dive for the bag.
 Among the features that stirred the fans to enthusiasm were Jimmy Noonan's two doubles and two singles in five times at bat, two nice throws by Claude Laine with hand runners at second bag in the first inning. Duff pulled off the spectacular feinting feat when he jumped after and pulled down bunched-up lefty one from Mulcahy's bat in the seventh which retired the side with two on bases. Lefty Smith fanned the two preceding batters.

Pitcher Lefty Smith was in the box for Norwich, intent on showing his stuff to Middletown batters, who took a game from him earlier in the season and have been blowing about it ever since. Lefty fanned an even dozen, including the redoubtable Bannan. It is said this is the first time Tommy has fanned more than a dozen in a game. Smith's puzzling work was the pitching of Baley and Bates for Middletown, who were both hit hard at the right times by the home stickers. Baley was wild as well, and after he had passed the first man in the second inning, he was sent to the pen, while Bates came in from right field to the box and Ferris went to right. The changed batting order of the Norwich team worked wrong from the first, Noonan beginning with a two-bagger. Aided by some crazy playing, in which Middletown's catcher and Dunlap, short featured, Norwich scored five runs in the first and one in the second.
