STATE EMPLOYMENT BUREAU.

Sets Working Folks to Wondering—Were April Situations Worth While?

Considerable talk has been heard regarding the report of the State employment bureau for April. The interesting question being raised by many of the 87 males and 96 females for whom "situations" were secured had obtained permanent employment. A case was cited of a man engaged through the agency for three or four hours of house cleaning work and it was suggested that perhaps the man had secured a more or less general belief exists that the bureau is a clearing house for rounders of both sexes who are willing to work just enough to live and that first-class servants are not to be reached through it.

In regard to the last statement the superintendent of the bureau, George C. Minor, says that many of the applicants for work are persons who are practically "down and out" and who have not the money to either advertise for places or to patronize the private employment agencies. If situations, either on temporary or permanent basis, are found for such applicants, men and women who are greatly in need of work, he thinks the bureau should report credit for it in the monthly reports. However, if a man should have secured a few hours' employment and should then, immediately or soon thereafter, be sent to another place, then, says Mr. Minor, the two "situations" would be reckoned as one.

OF THE PLACES FOUND FOR MEN AND WOMEN during the month of April, the superintendent estimates that fully 75 per cent. were what might be called permanent.—Waterbury American.
