It lasted for an hour, and in the morning, when the storm had passed and the sun rose, there on the decks, covering the awnings and almost filling the boats, hatched the canary birds. There were thousands of dead and dying canary birds. Capt. Sandberg says there were thousands of them. Some of them had blundered into the state-rooms in the darkness after the electric lights were out.

So the City of Para came safely through the storm when it rained canary birds. All save the gilt ball at the top of the foretopmast, half of which was lost overboard.—San Francisco Chronicle.

Lively Campaign in Mexico.

There is restlessness in the border states of Mexico against the methods adopted by the government to promote a peaceful campaign for the presidency, has for some time been apparent. The enforced subsidence of an anti-Diaz candidate when the campaign was opened by no means quieted the opposition. The political exiles in Yucatan have created a diversion calculated to draw heavily on the military force, while the insurgents on the Arizona frontier, at the other extremity of the country, are proceeding to develop military. Meanwhile one Mr. de Nuevo Leon, which lies between, formally announces his candidacy for the presidency, calls upon the administration for physical protection in making his campaign, and is promptly clapped into jail. This has stirred the anti-Diaz faction to tumultuous demonstrations all along the Rio Grande and the northern frontier. It is plain that the steam roller will be busily employed from now to election day.—Providence Journal.
