FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

GENERAL NET GAINS
Retained at the Irregular Closing of Stock Market.

New York, July 6.—There was a disposition today in the financial district to turn the attention of investors to the action of the stock market to the partial relief of the situation lately preferred, such as the railroad policy of the government, delayed interpretation of the Sherman law, and the resumption of the increased prominence given to the subject of the banking situation given out of the published expressions of some of the distinguished banking authorities of the interior regarding the farm land speculation and the consequences to be expected therefrom. The subject has been dwelt on for months past and with special stress ever since the abstract reports of national banks under the last controller's call in March became known, obscuring a loan expansion in a year-time of half a million dollars. This special stress on the subject has kept alive conviction that the objectionable position was in course of correction. That conviction is not necessarily shared by the interior banking authorities now quoted. There is complaint that the smaller banks are still burdened with mortgages and with their paper instead of the usual investments in commercial paper, which would be a more desirable position. The position will have to be met to a larger extent than usual by calling on the national banking centers for accommodation.

The intimation that the reports now being sent to the controller will not show the expected improvement in the credit position had a disturbing effect on the market, and the result was a steady decline in prices today. Some few stocks then fell to below last week's levels, but the general movement was up at the lowest for the year.

The importance attached to the present position of the controller and the relative sentiment ready to be easily influenced by the reports that gold had been shipped to the interior, which is in New York. The violent recovery in stocks was the result. While the general course of foreign exchange has presented such a movement, today's engagements came sooner than was expected.

The effect was to stiffen the private discount rate in London and around some question whether the official bank rate would be reduced tomorrow, as was expected. It is not believed, however, that any determined obstacle will be opposed to the movement of gold to New York. The London money market is in a strong position of confidence with the prospective redemptions of short term government obligations, is likely to become reluctant to sell. The decline in wheat and corn helped stocks, the strong rally in wheat on account of the drought in the United States spring wheat region helping to unsettle the rally to the last. The early severe decline in wheat and corn, however, and general net gains were retained at the irregular closing.
