CRIMINAL CARELESSNESS. That Peter Bridges' Bullet Caused the Death of Philip Loomis—Body at Home of Sheriff and Mrs. P. B. Sibley.

That Peter Bridges is the boy who probably caused the death of Philip Loomis at Alexander's lake Thursday evening is being established by a warning to drop to a place of safety in the bottom of the boat, but before they could so the second bullet—the last fired, crashed through Philip's brain.

That the accident may be chargeable to criminal carelessness only is also satisfactorily established. There was no motive to commit such a deed and the boy's relatives agree that it was an accident.

Lobster Hatchery Closes Season—About 15,000,000 Fry Put Overboard—Golden Wedding of Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Merritt.

The state lobster hatchery on Water street closed the hatching season Friday. Owing to the refusal of some of the lobstermen to bring in egg lobsters, the work at the hatchery was about half as much as that of the season of 1909.

Although the jars and aquaria have been put away, the hatchery will be open for the purchase of egg lobsters, which will be put in cars until next season.

Supt. Latham Rathbun stated Friday that about 15,000,000 lobster fry have been put overboard this year. About \$2,000,000 of the fry were released last year.
