COMMISSIONERS FOR THE ENSUING YEAR

Drawn by the Commissioners at Annual Session Here - Selectmen Fail to Send in Sufficient Number in Some Cases.

The jury commissioners, Col. C. W. Gale of this city and Major Walter Fitzmaurice of London, held their annual session at the office of G. E. Parsons, clerk of the superior court, Monday, when the jurors liable for duty in this county for the ensuing year were chosen. The selectmen are required to furnish the number of names which their town is entitled to for jurors and this year there was an increase in number from each town. Because the selectmen in some towns failed to send in twice as many names as the law allows, the jury law they do not get an increased number of jurors. They sent in the same number they had been accustomed to, with the result that the commissioners had to select half of the number, leaving them one-third short of the full number they were entitled to.

ARON W. DICKEY. Aron W. Dickey passed away at his home in Norwich town on Wednesday morning at eleven o'clock after a few days' illness at his home. He had not been in good health for a long time and his death was hastened by a complication of diseases.

He was born in Elba, N. Y., January 25, 1847, and was the son of John and Katherine Dickey. Soon after his parents moved to Hazel Green, Iowa. At the age of twenty years he came to Norwich, Conn., where he has since resided. He entered the employ of Henry G. Huntington, who owned a grocery store and later opened a furniture store on Broadway in the same building where the Del-Hof hotel is now located. When Mr. Huntington moved away from Norwich, Mr. Dickey and George Kamp bought out the business of Mr. Huntington.

Mr. Dickey was one of the charter members of the Norwich Rural association. He was largely instrumental in having the annual convention of the association held in Norwich, Conn., and in choosing Norwich as their meeting place and notwithstanding tempting offers from other places the association annually meets here. He was always the life of the tournament and a favorite with all.

He was at one time treasurer and chairman on board walks committee of the Norwich Rural association. He was a valued member of the school board of education of the Town street district and was also chairman of the finance committee. He had served as administrator of estates.

An earnest worker and beloved member of the First Congregational church, which he joined in 1867, he had served on the board of trustees and with his long and active life he was always a part since the present choir was formed. For a long time he taught a class in Sunday school and in 1891, when the state vice president, Mr. Sullivan county vice president and Mrs. Henley county president of the auxiliary.

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
