MUCH ACTIVITY AT RAILROAD YARD

Forty-six Car Freight Sent to Palmer—Strike Breakers Busy Switching Cars—Supt. Costello a Worker.

The vicinity of the railroad station was the scene of considerable activity all day Thursday, as many people were attracted by the efforts of the officials of the Central Vermont railroad, with the aid of a small army of strike breakers, safeguarded by detectives, in attempting to run freights through the city both north and south. A long freight, for the Central Vermont, one of 46 cars, went up about six o'clock in the morning, but it is said that it only ran as far as Palmer as its engine came back here and worked around the yard in conjunction with another during the afternoon switching cars about. The cars being switched were principally foreign cars, and it is thought that the officials were anxious to get these rounded up so as to cut down on the heavy demurrage charges that are piling up daily because of the strike. Superintendent Costello was a busy man and worked like a beaver all day, chasing up and down the road. The strikers seemed to have a somewhat scant knowledge of the signals, for they were constantly in hot water with the engineers who worked cautiously through the well filled yards. Engines were at work at both ends of the yard. A shipment of ice in box cars from South Willimantic stood upon the fourth track for hours placidly melting away. The ice was billed for New London, but the consignees are probably waiting still for it. The officials of the Willimantic gas and electric light company tried to induce the Central Vermont people to set off and place a car of coal for them near the boiler house. The company's supply is getting low and unless something is done to alleviate the situation the plant may be tied up also.

Prohibition Strategy.

The platform of the prohibitionists of Massachusetts contains a plank which denounces the restriction of the number of liquor licenses, on the ground that it creates a monopoly. When the High License law was adopted in this state the prohibitionists argued in its favor was the other side of the license would be increased and a larger revenue received by the state and in Boston, where formerly there had been as many as 2,000 small licensed saloons, the number was reduced until the whole number is now about 1,000. The prohibitionists contend that this would be a great benefit to the business to that number of licenses. A Popular Deception.

The Weavans Island takes no stock in the popular impression that the boll weevil and four weeks of wet weather have wrought great injury to the cotton crop. That newspaper has heard from a great number of growers to the effect that the boll weevil damage so far seems less than a year ago. A visiting cotton grower from Texas confirms this hopeful view. He reports that Texas will make something like 4,000,000 bales of cotton this year, and concludes: "The people of Louisiana and Mississippi made a great mistake by getting so demoralized over the boll weevil and letting their labor leave and selling their mules for nothing. They will want to get back before they are two years older, unless they can get Polanders and Germans to rent their land."
