Happenings in and About Westery.

Druggist Almy Under \$500 Bonds in Connection With Blindness from Poisoned Whiskey—Berr Seized in Fierce Street Raid—William Stinson's Case Continued—Saturday Game With Mystic Frosted—White Rock and Stonington Winners.

The outing of republicans in Newport last week, and the entertainment given by E. Livingstone Beekman at his Land's End estate, has attracted the attention of Mr. Beekman by the party leaders for the office of lieutenant governor, and a general review and consideration of the politics of the state of Rhode Island. It is agreed that in the event of the present incumbent, Mr. Berr, being appointed state tax commissioner, an office yet to be created, he will withdraw in favor of Mr. Beekman. It is given out already that Mr. Beekman has the united support of the party leaders in Washington county.

There is general unanimity in the party throughout the state with the possible exception of the rupture in Washington county. Mr. Beekman is being nominated for governor for a third term, and the only charge in the state ticket will be that of lieutenant governor. Some of the local party leaders are urging Representative Albert H. Langworthy to enter into a contest with Senator Louis W. Arnold as Westery's representative in the state senate.

There are to be two representatives from Westery in the general assembly under the redistricting law, and in the event of Mr. Langworthy entering into a contest for the senate, the present sure opportunity of continuing as a member of the lower house. With Mr. Langworthy out of the picture, the successor of Mr. Langworthy, up to the present the only candidates announced as after the nomination for second representative on the republican side are Joseph T. Murphy and Thomas W. Biddies. It is doubtful whether the democrats will make any nominations for senator or representative, as there are not enough of them in Westery to make a respectable showing. By a combination of four seats with the surrounding towns, they really did elect two democrats and a prohibitionist to membership in the town council.

Dr. William A. Hilliard has been chosen a historian for the seventy-fifth anniversary of the First Baptist church of Westery, and is collecting the data for a complete and interesting historical address. The actual date of the anniversary is Friday, September 16, but it has been decided to hold the main observance on Sunday, September 25, with the historical address as a feature of the service. In the evening there will be a sermon by Professor William Herbert Perry Faunce, president of Brown university.

Willis Almy of the city pharmacy has been arrested upon a serious charge in connection with the blindness of Vincent Stillman, although there is no evidence directly introduced yet which connects Almy with the crime, save the statement of Stillman that he bought the medicine from which he drank just before becoming blind, two weeks ago, at the city pharmacy. The blindness was caused by wood alcohol, the statement being based upon the finding of physicians who admitted the fact, and which, and which, was extensively partially denied, pending examination by experts. Mr. Stillman had drunk from a pint of whiskey and an ounce and a half remained in the bottle when he summoned medical assistance by reason of his approaching blindness. This liquid was taken for analysis and found by State Chemist George W. Perkins to contain 38 per cent. of wood alcohol.


