200,000,000 GALLONS To Be Added to Norwich's Water Supply by New Reservoir. It is probable that the huge dam which is being constructed at what is known as Brown's reservoir will add to the city's water supply of the first part of November, and the water supply of the city of Norwich will be increased to 200,000,000 gallons, which will be the capacity of new reservoir when completed. Work on the construction of the dam is being carried on rapidly but quietly by a large force of workmen under the direction of the Johnson Hooker Co. of New York city, who have the contract for the work.

The main dam averages 28 feet in height and is 200 feet long. On the feet of the top. It is figured that more than three-fourths of the dirt which will be needed on the dam is of the most modern construction, and although used in many cities in the state is something new in Norwich. The dam is of the Grube and Scott reservoirs are of solid masonry construction. The new dam is made mostly of earth, and it can be readily seen that it is a stone dam, where if a leak starts in a stone dam, it is impossible to repair it. A core wall of stone only a few feet in thickness is being built on the inside and on the outside of this was placed dirt, which forms the dam. The embankment of dirt which forms the dam is 192 feet thick at the bottom. It runs up at a sharp pitch, and at the top of the core wall, the embankment which forms the dam will be about 35 feet in thickness. On the inside of the dam, which is built with stone blocks. When the wall is completed the ground which will be embankment of dirt which forms the dam will be given the final cleaning. Most of the loose stones, etc., have already been removed from the dam.

This reservoir will hold 200,000,000 gallons, and if in the future the demands of the city exceed the water supply, it is figured that the dam will be made sufficiently strong to stand the pressure of another ten feet being added on the top, which will increase the reservoir's capacity 50,000,000 gallons more. The Grube reservoir has a capacity of 62,000,000 gallons and the Scott dam holds about 60,000,000 gallons and the reserve tank on Spring Hill holds 6,000,000 gallons. The average daily consumption of the city is about 2,500,000 gallons.—Norwich Hour.
