IN AND ABOUT WESTERY Guest Sued for Beating Her Hostess—Welch Building Foundation Walls Rising—Change of Grade in Granite Street Necessary—Firemen Attend Funeral of George S. Burdick—Pitcher Lynch Released.

Attorney Clarence E. Roche, as counsel for Mrs. Josephine Gentle, has brought civil suit against Mrs. Charlotte Gallucci to recover \$500 in damages for injuries alleged to have been inflicted. The parties are neighbors in Pierce street. Mrs. Gentle invited Mrs. Gallucci to make a friendly call. The invitation was accepted and just as soon as the visitor arrived she took from under her apron a wooden club and belabored her would-be hostess. Mrs. Gallucci was bruised in the shoulders and arms, and but for rescue her cries for assistance would have been believed that she would have been killed.

The rear and side foundation walls for the James A. Welch building in Broad street are now completed. Work will soon be begun on the front foundation wall and also the retaining wall which will be well out towards the curb as the building is to be an open area for the purpose of giving light in the cellar and will necessitate the laying of a partition wall on the side. The building will be of brick, three stories, and be a marked improvement in that section of the city.

The part of the old building that was saved from destruction by fire and used by Mr. Welch as an office and the waiting room of the Norwich-Westerly trolley road will be moved to a temporary location just around the corner in Union street on the site of the burned Grand Army banquet hall.

Town Sergeant Herbert P. Clark has served notices on property owners in Granite street, between Summer and Westery streets, to attend a hearing before the town council relative to a change of grade in the street. When franchise was granted the Norwich-Westerly trolley company to extend to Pleasant View the route was planned by way of Granite street and a new grade was established in the street for that purpose which included the cutting down of the street four feet on the east side of the street. The present established grade to permit of proposed improvements in that section.

When the trolley tracks were laid in a right-angled triangle in Dixon square to permit of transfer of cars and reversing the same and serving the purpose of a round table for the convenience of the Norwich-Westerly and Pawtucket Valley roads the overhead was not completed. There was no trolley wire over one side of the triangle and the cars in making the run over this section was done on the flying switch plan.

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In removing a copper trolley wire that had been in use nine years of the wiremen remarked Wednesday that the old copper was of more financial value at the present time than when it was put up new for the trolley car service.

The funeral of George E. Burdick was held on Wednesday with a mass at the residence of Mrs. Burdick, 117 Main street.
