The Bulletin. Christian Treatment of Immigrants. Set Forth in Sermon by Rev. Dr. M. S. Kaufman at the Methodist Church Sunday Morning.

At the Trinity M. E. church Sunday morning Rev. Dr. M. S. Kaufman preached from Leviticus 19: 33-34, his theme being 'The Christian Treatment of Our Immigrant Peoples. He said: 'For many years, among the most perplexing of American social problems, has been that of immigration. In view of the multiplied millions coming to our shores from other lands it has been a stupendous task for the republic to render homogeneous the vast heterogeneous people who have cast in their lot with us. This hard question has been: Can America Americanize her foreigners or will the foreigners remain to remain foreigners? They will continue to maintain their supremacy cannot be doubted, provided they retain the superior and inspiring of Christianity. But should our American institutions and spirit be robbed of their distinctive Christian elements then, like the republics of other ages, ours would be unable to withstand the tide that would inevitably assail it. The Christian spirit is itself indispensable to our security, perpetuity and prosperity. Especially is this spirit needed in the treatment of immigrants. Nothing else can by any possibility assimilate them to our free institutions and lead them into the forces of national strength. It is incumbent upon us to estimate the past and to appraise the future. We have been so accustomed to boast that it has become easy to masterfully and unselfishly to assimilate all others, it is clear that in the chief essentials of national greatness our nation does excel all other countries. Every one of our immigrants other nations do surpass ours. For example, in art, Italy is far ahead of us. In literature we fall far behind France and Great Britain. In learning Germany is much in advance. Then there is another serious factor that should not be overlooked, and that is, for all our greatness we are very largely indebted to men and women of foreign birth. Even our independence and our Civil War were won by the help of invaluable assistance received from able generals and private soldiers who first saw the light across the sea. Many of the mechanical inventions of this age and the engines that have come from the brains of our foreign citizens. In legislation, in the commercial realm, in education, in all the leading industries of our country and state, we have been compelled to acknowledge our indebtedness to superior men from other lands. We are sometimes reminded that our criminal classes are made up largely of foreigners. Yet foreigners have built our railroads and canals, they have done and are still doing much of the drudgery without which no nation can prosper, and in the preparation of our immigrants we are deeply indebted to many benefits which they have contributed to our country.

Shortly after 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon Michael Barry, the 13 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Barry, of Central avenue, met with a painful and possibly serious accident. Upon examination at the hospital it was found that the boy had dislocated his right shoulder, fractured his wrist and broken his right leg between the hip and knee. He also received several cuts on his head. These were bandaged and every possible attention was given to the boy, but it cannot be told for two or three days just how serious his condition is.
