WESTERLY ASSESSORS GET BUSY.

Begin Annual Valuation of Taxable Property—Town May Have Sanitary Bubble Fountains—Result of Drug Store Raid—Juvenile Department at Library Popular—Dunn-Sweeney Marriage With Nuptial Mass on Wednesday.

The Rhode Island Anti-Tuberculosis association and the state board of health are considering legislation for the abolition of the common drinking cups in public places, schools and railroad trains, which will mean the going away with the iron cups attached to the public drinking fountains of Westery, which have been for years considered a public convenience and necessity.

Armed with search warrants, police officers made simultaneous descent upon four drug stores, Saturday for the purpose of ascertaining whether the liquor laws were being violated. Although the drug stores were located in the heart of the business center of the town, three of them being practically in Dixon square and the fourth in Main street, the raids were conducted so secretly that the movements of the police were noticed by few.

However, yielding to public opinion, the police committee gave sudden and imperative orders for the police to make raids at the same moment upon the Rhode Island drug store, Harbour's pharmacy, O. C. Scott & Co's drug store and the Thomas J. Bannon drug store.

Chief Brandstedt and Police Constable Boardman raided the drug store of Rhode Island, Sergeant Brown and Police Constable Blom went to Bannon's, Police Constable West and Police Constable Latham to Scott's, and Police Constable Mitchell and Police Constable Greene to Harbour's. The only liquor found and seized were at Bannon's, as no liquor was to be found at the other places.

At Bannon's, Sergeant Brown and his assistants seized a two-quart bottle of rum, two-quart bottle of gin, three-quart bottle of whiskey, one bottle of whiskey, five-gallon jug containing a gallon of whiskey, four-gallon jug containing half a gallon of rum, seventeen bottles of gin and sixteen bottles of lager.
