POLICE COURT.

Gamesters' Cases Continued—Fine for Violation of Auto Law. The police court gallery was filled Friday morning, many of those present being local automobilists who were interested in the outcome of the case in which Alvin Rodman was implicated for a violation of the law in operating his machine to and from the fair grounds, and others attracted to the court by the case of the slot machine men who were arrested Thursday afternoon by Officer W. E. Jackson of the state police force.

First Selectman S. Arnold Peckham testified to having noticed Rodman's machine because the fact that it was not at his home on account of its loud noise was emitted on account of its muffler being open, and also to his seeing it driving at the junction of Main and Union streets, and stated that in his opinion the machine was being operated at a speed of from 25 to 30 miles an hour with trolley car passing and a large number of people crossing and recrossing the street.

Rodman claimed that it was not all his fault, as the muffler parts on the machine were not in proper order and had been in Chesbro's garage for some time before doing any business. Some changes in the working mechanism of the machine made him believe that noise could be emitted at times which he could not help. Mr. Chesbro explained the changes that had been made in the muffler and Mr. Rodman was given the benefit of the doubt with regard to the poor workings of his machine and the court was satisfied that he was not fined \$20 and costs for reckless driving.
