THE COUNTRY'S OUTPUT FOR FUEL

About one-third of the wood consumed annually in this country is burned, or seven thousand million cubic feet. The latest statistics set forth the facts as follows: The total estimated consumption of firewood is \$5,928,806 cords, and of this 70,000,000 cords, or 81.4 per cent., was used on the farms, 14.7 per cent. in the towns and cities with a population of from 1,000 to 30,000, 1.9 per cent. in cities of over 30,000 population, and the remaining 2 per cent. in various operations.
