

FRIDAY NIGHT RAIDS IN WESTERY

Liquors Found in Both Places—Disposal of Cases in Third District Court—William Smith Gets Jail Sentence—His Case Appealed—Young Men Quarrel and are Fined—Thomas W. Biddles to Bolt and Run Independently.

On Friday night there were two liquor raids in Westery. Chief Bransfield and Officer West led the one on Robert avenue at the home of Mrs. Caroline Catto, where 120 bottles and two barrels of liquor were seized.

The second raid, by Sergeant Thomas E. Bell and an officer, was directed against Thomas Lionece of Marion street. Here was found one barrel of ale.

A quartette of liquor seizure cases were disposed of by Judge Oliver H. Williams in the Third district court Friday as follows: Evidence that the police department is active in its efforts to suppress the sale of intoxicating liquors in the no-license town of Westery. This method has been in vogue for many years, but the sale of liquor continues, thus strengthening the common law prohibition.

The first case was against the liquors and vessels containing same seized on the premises of Mrs. Virginia Catto in Tower street. Chief Bransfield told the court of visiting the place, by virtue of a search warrant, and seizing one barrel of ale on draught, 162 bottles of ale, four gallons of whiskey and one quart of rum.

The next case was against liquors seized at the store of Antonio Pignatelli in the Niantic section of the town of Westery. Chief Bransfield testified to the seizure of a barrel of ale and a barrel partially filled with wine.
