**TWO DIVORCE PETITIONS GRANTED**

Third Case Continued for More Evidence—Short Calendar Business at New London.

There were 26 cases on the short calendar list at the session in New London on Friday morning. Of that number just half went off the list, while action was taken in the remainder. In one case when the attorney stated that it was ready he was informed by the judge that because of court fees due he was barred by the rules from appearing in court. The matter was adjourned during the session and the matter heard at the foot of the list.

In the case of Alexander vs. R. A. Sherman's Sons' Co., a motion to exchange was granted and an amended answer ordered in two weeks.

A bond of \$75 to prosecute was ordered in two weeks in the case of Kelley, admr. vs. Bradbury. The sum of \$35 was ordered in a month as an allowance to defend in the case of Duncan S. Carson vs. Annie E. Carson.

There was a hearing on the motion to strike from the files in the case of Pastore vs. Kalaf and the judge took the papers. The receiver's account in the case of Williams vs. Hawkins and others was allowed.

Judgment by stipulation was granted in the case of Gardiner Greene, trustee vs. James and others. The amount is \$2,579.62 and the time fixed for redemption is the third Monday in February and Mr. Lee the following Tuesday.

In the case of Johnson Home vs. Gilbert S. Raymond, trz and others, pleadings were ordered in two weeks on a motion for default for failure to plead.

Judge of foreclosure was granted in the case of Bailey vs. Freno and others, the second Tuesday in December being fixed as the time for redemption. The amount is \$1,284.60.

In the case of Hattie King Rochholz vs. John Rochholz, answer is required in one week to the motion that the case be placed on the uncontested list for failure to plead.

The motion that the case of C. E. Whitney vs. E. K. Manning be transferred to the jury docket was heard by Judge Burpee, who took the papers.

**Divorce Cases Heard.** Three of the divorce cases were heard, two being granted and one continued. The other two went off the list.

A story of married life which lasted but six short weeks was unraveled when Mary A. Hall of Norwich appeared, asking divorce from W. H. Hall of parts unknown on the grounds of desertion and bigamy.

Mrs. Hall testified that she was married to Hall ten years ago. They had been married but six weeks when Hall disappeared. She next heard of her husband when he was sentenced to one year in prison. Since then she has seen her husband but once and then refused to recognize him.

Judge Burpee gave Mrs. Hall the decree on the ground of desertion after other witnesses had corroborated her testimony.

**Husband Gets the Decree.** A peculiar case was that of Minnie Whitney against Charles Whitney. Mrs. Whitney brought the divorce suit and her husband filed a cross bill. The husband's case was a strong one and Mrs. Whitney dropped her suit, so that Whitney, who would have been the defendant, received the decree.

He was given the decree on the ground of adultery. In his cross bill he alleged that his wife had been intolerably cruel to him and that between September, 1905, and August, 1910, she had on divers dates committed adultery with William Houle in Stonington and Westerly. Houle was a soldier at Fort Mansfield, Napatree Point, and deserted. One of the army bills advertising Houle as a deserter and offering reward was introduced as evidence.

In her original complaint, Mrs. Whitney had alleged intolerable cruelty. Stonington is the home of the Whitneys. Mrs. Whitney's name was Minnie Pompat, but she was married to Whitney under the name of Jordan.

Ernest Pearson wanted a divorce from Iva E. Pearson. The Pearsons were married in North Stonington September 16, 1907. The complaint alleged that Mrs. Pearson had committed adultery several times with John Christie in New Bedford, in Winham and other places.

Mrs. Pearson is now residing in Winham, where it is claimed that she has had a child by Christie. She had previously had a child by her husband. Judge Burpee thought the allegation a serious one and that it demanded further proof than the evidence of the witnesses and the birth certificate and the case went over to next Thursday.

The two cases postponed were those of Wallace Rolf vs. Alice May Rolf and Frances J. U. N. Webster vs. H. B. Webster.
