### WATER SITUATION DOESN'T IMPROVE

Fairview Reservoir is Now Down 303 Inches—At Mohegan Lake 1800 Feet of Pipe are Laid—Second Well Driver Arrived Here Wednesday—All Drinking Water Should Be Boiled.

The measurement taken at Fairview reservoir on Wednesday by Superintendent Corkey of the water department showed the water to be 203 inches below high water mark, the drop being at the rate of three inches a day. The superintendent states that the large strainer has been lowered by the diver and the wellbore thus cleaned out as never before, while a strainer has been fitted to the pipe which will permit the draining of the pond if necessary. He says that too much emphasis cannot be given to the fact that all water taken from the city mains now should be boiled before it is used for drinking purposes. The pond is far below the point from which it was ever intended water should be drawn and to be on the side of safety this sterilization should be done. It is in the interests of good health and a precautionary method.

The measurement of the amount of water being received from the well since the last announcement, but it was said then and it is believed now that the further the well goes down the larger the supply of water. When President Ray of the company which is driving the well was here a few days ago he was asked what he thought of the dowsing method used by several of the dowsers before ten o'clock, and thereafter failing steadily through the night. It should be a help to the company and serve to check the consumption of the supply, though it will take a much harder run and a longer one to have much effect in adding to the supply at such a low point, 47 inches lower than it ever was before, a hard rain will not quickly add to the supply as the two watersheds should pour in good sized streams.




