

Fraternities In Westerly High School

Ordered to Disband—Deemed Detrimental to Progress and Efficiency of the School—Rogers-Wells Marriage—Elder George Adams on Trial Charged with Arson—Sunset Farm Witnessed by Big House.

The home of Mrs. Harriet L. Wells, 118 High street, was beautifully decorated Tuesday evening for the marriage of Miss Helen Maxson West and D. Harold Rogers, graduate of Westerly High school, 1904, and Amherst, 1907. The ceremony was performed in the parlor by Rev. Samuel H. Davis officiating. The bride was escorted into the parlor by her uncle, George W. Frisvold, and was given away by her mother, Mrs. Harriet L. Wells. The maid of honor was Miss Heather Dodge, and Roscoe Seely, son of the groom, acted as best man.

The bride wore a white satin gown, cut on the train with Brussels lace and pearl trimming, and silk tulle veil under Brussels lace cap. She carried a bouquet of white roses and lilies of the valley.

Miss Dodge, the maid of honor, wore pale blue mesquite with evening party of pale blue chiffon, trimmed with Chantilly lace, and carried pink roses and lilies of the valley.

Little Miss Hoyt, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. D. H. Hoyt, of Providence, was the flower girl. She was dressed in white with pale blue trimming, and carried a basket of pink roses.

A reception and supper followed the ceremony. Mrs. Rogers left on the 7.32 westbound express train on their wedding journey.

Acting upon the instructions of the committee on schools, William H. Holmes, Jr., superintendent of schools, and John H. Swan, principal, have taken heroic measures to put an end to the secret societies in the Westerly High school. They have selected the M. B. C. society, the oldest organization, as a starter, believing that if this one can be forced to disband the other two secret societies connected with the school will fall into line without any special heroic action on the part of the school officials.

Either a whole or partial list of the members of the M. B. C. society has been obtained by the superintendent, and a list of those who should be called into the school and informed that they must leave the school and remain out until such time as the secret societies therein, while they are pupils of the Westerly High school, are not of the student body.

In order to be reinstated, the suspended students must show official certificates that they have resigned from the M. B. C. society, and will not hold any office or membership therein, while they are pupils of the Westerly High school.

The other boys' secret organization is the H. T. S. society, said to have a membership of 18, or about three times as many as the M. B. C. society. This secret society of girls is designated as the T. J. S. society, and the school committee declares that this society must be abolished. Should the same heroic discipline be applied to the members of the H. T. S. and the T. J. S. it would mean practically the closing of the Westerly High school.

It is proposed to hold a joint meeting of the school committee, the faculty of the High school and parents of the pupils for a general discussion of the subject, so that the whole matter may be clearly understood. The school committee claims that these secret societies are detrimental to the progress and efficiency of the school.

PASSENGER SERVICE NOT PAYING FAIR RETURNS.

Street Railway Companies Apply for Right to Carry Freight.

Boston, Nov. 29.—Street railway companies in all parts of Massachusetts have recently applied for the right to carry freight, and these requests have met with the approval of the state railroad commission. This action has been taken, it is said, today, because the passenger service has not been paying fair returns. Forty-one out of the eighty-one companies in the state paid no dividends last year, and those that did pay them ranged from 2 to 10 per cent. The first franchise for trolley freight cars was granted about three years ago.
