Assaulted Lebanon Farmer. George Merrins and Thomas Sullivan arrested by State Police—held in \$5,000 bonds each.

William B. Chamberlain, aged about 70, a wealthy farmer of Lebanon, was attacked on the highway on his way home from Colchester late Monday evening Nov. 21st.

Complaint was made to the state police Sunday and as a result Officer W. E. Jackson of this city, who was assigned to the case, apprehended two men in Colchester Tuesday evening at about 10 o'clock.

The men are George Merrins, aged 39, of Lebanon, and Thomas Sullivan, aged 39, of Hartford. Merrins has done time in the Hartford county jail for being convicted of theft.

Chamberlain was found in the early dawn an empty tobacco box was also found that he usually carries in his pocket, and a full quart bottle of gin that Merrins had been known to have had when he left a Colchester saloon.

The authorities have two cart staves covered with blood which are believed to have been used in the assault upon Mr. Chamberlain.

It is reported that it is practically impracticable that Mr. Chamberlain's condition will be such as to appear at the trial, even on the date set.

Officer Jackson brought the prisoners to this city on the afternoon train Wednesday and placed them in the local station house.
