

WESTERLY LINE IMPROVED Blair Cameron Falls Twenty-five Feet from Telegraph Pole—Improving Western Union Service—Fire Department Matters—Heptasophs Elect Officers.

Blair Cameron, employed as line-man for the Western Union Telegraph company, under contract with N. W. Mayes company of Providence, and at work in Westerly in connection with the transfer of the Western Union Telegraph office from the railway station to a pole near the railway station Saturday morning and was seriously injured. He was near the top of the pole when he slipped and fell a distance of 25 feet striking on his feet. Cameron had his steel climbing straps attached to his legs at the time of the accident and they probably saved him from more serious injury.

With the change of the Western Union Telegraph office from the railway station to Main street, the people of Westerly will be given a regular 24 hours service and other improved message service in connection with the Automatic Telephone company. Messages can be telephoned in and charged to the telephone number from where the messages are sent, and then sent street by wire from Westerly, instead of being telephoned to the office in New London in the night season, as has heretofore been the custom.

The re-election of Samuel G. Cottrell as chief engineer of the Westerly fire district, which is expected to be held in his yearly personal allowance of \$200, making a total of \$300, and the re-election of the other members of the board of engineers in positive evidence that the taxpayers are satisfied with the work of the competent and experienced chief and his assistants. The board of engineers are considered fully qualified to manage the working force of the department and up to a year ago the board was considered by reason of their fire fighting experience, qualified to purchase the supplies needed in the department.

A year ago it was voted to establish a new fire alarm system and to have a chemical tank installed in one of the hose wagons. In these matters the board of engineers was honored and a committee of citizens, with no knowledge of the matter, was appointed.




