GUilty OF MANSLAUGHTER. Verdict Rendered in Trial of Mrs. Jeanette Anderson.

New York, Dec. 19.—Guilty of manslaughter, with a recommendation to mercy, was the verdict rendered this afternoon by the jury before which Mrs. Jeanette Anderson has been on trial in the supreme court for stabbing and killing James Wilson, her husband's half-brother, last July.

Testimony showed that Wilson had been drinking and demanded money of Mrs. Anderson, who refused to give it. She followed him into the hall of her home, where Wilson was found dead with a carving knife by his side.

Cable-Telegraph-Telephone Combine

Mackay Says Postal Telegraph and Commercial Cable Companies will Neither Enter Any Combination nor Sell Out.

New York, Dec. 19.—Clarence H. Mackay, on being shown the announcement from London that the Western Union Telegraph company, with two submarine cables from the United States to Europe, has now acquired control of the four submarine cables owned by the Anglo-American Telegraph company, said: "The only competition now left is the Commercial Cable company on the ocean and the Postal Telegraph company on the land."

MOCK THREAT OF SUICIDE LEADS TO REAL THING.

Fatal Termination of Lovers' Quarrel at Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Dec. 19.—Snuffing a goblet of carbolic acid from the hands of his fiancée as she stood threatening suicide as the result of a quarrel today, Charles Morback, thirty years of age, drank the contents himself and died a few minutes later, according to the police, who investigated his death.

Mrs. Kalek, the fiancée and only witness of the affair, says she did not see the man drink the acid and doubted that he did. Mrs. Kalek, suffering with acid burns on face, hands and arms, refused to believe that the man she was to have married is dead.

Better Treatment for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers. Washington, Dec. 19.—Segregation of habitual drunkards, a sweeping extension of membership eligibility to former veterans, steps to minimize the feeling between civil war veterans and other volunteers, and better menus are among the recommendations made in a comprehensive report on the national office for disabled volunteer soldiers submitted to congress today.

Railroad Strike Called Off. St. Louis, Dec. 19.—The strike of the machinists, boiler-makers and blacksmiths against the Missouri Pacific Iron Mountain system, has been called off. Formal announcement to this effect was made tonight.

IMPORTANT SURGICAL OPERATION.

If Successful on Dog May Prove Boon to Human Brain and Eye Ailments.

Boston, Dec. 19.—That persons now thought to be incurably insane may be brought back to reason, and that persons now totally blind may have their eyesight restored, is the belief of physicians who are eagerly awaiting the results of a surgical operation to be performed at a Brookline-hospital for animals next week upon a valuable King Charles spaniel suffering from acute hypovolemia, a brain disease.

Prince Rex was taken to the hospital, where Doctors Ryan and Humphry, after an examination, pronounced that the dog was suffering from acute hypovolemia, and an operation was decided upon. The operation will consist either of forcing back a portion of the skull that is now pressing against the dog's brain or, in a more radical manner, that a portion of the matter that is now growing under the skull can be removed.

WIFE SLAYER'S BODY FOUND IN WOODS.

His Crime Was Perpetrated Last Month in Suburb of Yalesville.

Meriden, Conn., Dec. 19.—The body of George C. Runge, who shot and fatally injured his wife at Tracy, a hamlet in Yalesville, last month, was found by boys late today in an unfrequented spot not far from the scene of the shooting. An examination of the body was made by Dr. J. H. Buffum, medical examiner of Wallingford, who stated that Runge had committed suicide by taking a poison, probably cyanide or potassium, a quantity of the poison being found loose in the pockets of his clothing.

ELECTION FRAUDS AT MARTINIQUE.

Great Popular Indignation—Call to Arms Issued.

Fort de France, Martinique, Dec. 19.—Charges of gross frauds in connection with yesterday's elections in the several cantons are made. When the polls were closed the ballot boxes were brought into the city by the municipal officials and placed under protection, as was thought, for safekeeping.

CONGRESS SUMMARY.

Washington, Dec. 19.—As the result of a ruling by Vice-President Sherman that a senator having a pair with another senator could be counted to make up a quorum, the senate today, on motion of Senator Hale, refused to accept the dictum overruling it by a vote of 27 to 17.

Death of Noted Civil War Veteran. Juneville, Wis., Dec. 19.—Col. W. B. Britton, one of the last commanders of the Eighth Wisconsin regiment, known as the "Old Abe" regiment in the Civil war, which saw service around Vicksburg and in the march to the sea with Sherman, died here today.

Confirmations by Senate. Washington, Dec. 19.—The senate today confirmed the nomination of Edward R. Wright and Clarence J. Roberts to be associate justices of the supreme court of New Mexico and the nomination of D. M. Moore to be United States marshal for the district of Alaska, division No. 2.


