WARDEN BULLARD'S IDEAS ON CHARTER REVISION

Warden W. J. Bullard, who has filed through the secretary of state a petition to the next general assembly for a revision of the charter of the borough of Danieson, says that he is not ready to give up his office unless he is compensated, but that a charter is now being drafted that will not include many of the undesirable features of the present instrument, and that he hopes that it will be ready to present to the voters for their consideration at a special meeting, which he thinks should be called in about a month.

Warden Bullard is of the opinion that a commission of three men is sufficient to prepare a charter, and that under such guidance concentrated action would be more certain, rapid and satisfactory than that of the town.

SPORTSMAN WRATHY. Frees His Mind About Game Commissioners and Game Laws.

A writer from a nearby town fires the wrath of a people that are hunters and game protectors through the columns of a Hartford paper.

"I just want to see that the hunters to report to the town clerk the amount of game that each licensed hunter killed in the year. How about those who do not get a license? There are half of the hunters that do not get a license and they have no record at all. If they did, it would be a lie. You can't get a license unless you have a hundred dollars."

"The thing to do is to protect the game so that there will be something to report on. There ought to be a closed season for about three years, and that game is fast becoming exterminated. If not protected soon, I hope it will be exterminated. That will stop the black hunter from shaking over everybody's head."

"The hunters seem to think they own the game on everybody's land and can go anywhere they wish to, regardless of the owner. Every poor whop owns a ferret and is fast exterminating the timber rabbit, who hasn't had enough time to get back to his normal condition. It is not the hunters that are to be protected, but the game in these days. They have improved on all firearms since they were made to burst with muzzle-loading shotguns instead of the fast loading type, and also do away with the ferret, so the game will increase instead of diminish."

"As the law stands, I shall never get a license, and I will never get a license at any time of the year, for if they want the game exterminated we might as well have a hand in it. Do the commissioners want to protect the game? Is not this a job a political pull instead of game protection? It looks so, for they reap the same game
