THEY'RE OFF TOMORROW.

Baseball Season of 1911 Begins on Pacific Coast—Major League Soon After.

New York, March 26.—The crack of the bat and ball in the far west next Tuesday will usher in the 1911 season of professional baseball games, and before the diamonds are abandoned next fall they will number nearly 20,000, 22 games in the Pacific Coast league will be the first to begin, and in the 17 days now intervening before the opening of the American, the National and the American association seasons, all on April 12, two small southern leagues—the Cotton States and South Atlantic organizations—will start on April 3.

In quick succession after the beginning of the big league races, on April 12, the Southern, Eastern and Western leagues will open, followed by the Central league on April 26. The Connecticut league season will open on April 21, and the New York State will commence on May 3, and New England league on April 21.
