

DESIGNATION IN WAKE OF STORM

Buildings Demolished, Houses Unroofed, Railroads Blocked and Lives Lost

LIGHTNING ACCOMPANIED BY WINDS

A Kensington Factory Wrecked, Throwing 350 Out of Employment—Man Killed in Wreckage of Tacony Railroad Station—Another Killed by Falling Wires at Girard, O.—House Struck by Lightning at Danbury.

Philadelphia, March 27.—A severe electrical storm, accompanied by high wind which at times blew with the force of a tornado, swept over the northern section of the city shortly after 4 o'clock tonight.

Buildings Demolished, Houses Unroofed. Buildings were demolished, houses unroofed and the Pennsylvania railroad division of the Pennsylvania railroad temporarily placed out of commission.

Tacony Station Demolished. The greatest damage occurred, was completely cut off from the rest of the city.

Unknown Man Killed. At the Tacony station of the Pennsylvania railroad an unidentified man was killed when a portion of the structure of the station fell on him.

Kensington Factories Destroyed. In the manufacturing section of Kensington, in the morning, toward Tacony, several factories were destroyed.

350 Men Thrown Out of Work. Three hundred and fifty men who were employed here, will be thrown out of work for at least two weeks.

Church Cupola Blown Off. In the fashionable section of Germantown the storm also caused havoc.

Hospital Wall Crushed In. Many mills were unroofed by the storm in Maryland.

Train Service Resumed. Late tonight the Pennsylvania railroad resumed train service to New York.

Big Hailstones Fell. Reports from points throughout the state show that many towns in the southeastern section were visited by unusually large hailstones.

Creeds Flew Over Bridges. The waters of the main creek, which flows through the heart of the village, are running over the railroad bridge.

Man Killed by Falling Wires. A wind storm throughout northeastern Ohio, portion of West Virginia and western Pennsylvania late today, caused at least one fatality.

Stouboville Buildings Blown Down. Stouboville, Ohio, was struck by the storm. The roof was blown off the county infirmary and the walls of several other buildings were blown down.

Lightning Strikes at Danbury. Danbury, Conn., March 27.—One of the severest electrical storms to visit this city in several years passed over tonight.

Will Be Mexico's New Representative at Washington.

De La Barra in Cabinet. Madero Are Not After Office, Says Father of Rebel Chief—Women and Children Flew to Mountains.

Mexico City, March 27.—Coincident with the official announcement of a new cabinet today came that of the appointment of Manuel De La Barra, E. Indian as ambassador to the United States, succeeding Francisco Leon De La Barra, named secretary of foreign affairs.

Dehesa for Secretary of Interior. In the cabinet of the office of secretary of the interior was left vacant. Speculation is that the position will be filled by Teodoro Dehesa, governor of Vera Cruz and candidate for vice president at the last election.

Fire Marshal's Theory of New York Horror.

Carnegie Gives \$5,000. Heads Relief Fund for Sufferers—Report That Doors Leading to Fire Escape Were Locked.

The blame for the loss of 142 lives in the Washington Square fire of Saturday drew to a focus today the entire blame for the tragedy was placed on the fire marshal, the coroner, the state labor department, and Borough President McAdams of Manhattan.

An Additional Grand Jury. Grand jurors turned personal property and an additional grand jury in a formal resolution presented to the court of general sessions offered their aid to the district attorney and decried the widespread extent of the revolt for the disaster.

Found Doors Swinging Inward. What the profers found—evidence that doors at exits swung inward; the crumpled fire escape in the shaft; iron shutters when opened; an empty water tank on the roof; and the practice of locking the doors leading to fire exits were locked.

Doors to Exits Locked? The tenement house department announced that it does not do a preliminary step to a far-reaching investigation of tenements.

Fire Started from Cigarette. "So far as I can discover," he said, "there has never been a fire drill in the factory. In my opinion, it would take seven hundred girls three hours to reach the street by the one fire escape in that building.

Carnegie Contributes \$5,000. Thirty-three bodies, most of them those of children, were found in the unidentified tonight at the Charles Pier morgue.

Death List at 142. Final figures place the death list at 142, as announced last night. Of these 123 bodies were taken from the scene of the disaster and nine died in hospitals.

Caucus Fails to Make a Choice

New York's Senatorship Still in the Air.

Sheehan Had 28 Votes. Less Than One-Third of Vote Cast—Sheehan Supporters Have Little Hope of His Election.

Albany, N. Y., March 28.—The second democratic legislative caucus failed tonight to select a candidate for United States senator and was called to re-convene tomorrow night.

Result of the Vote. The caucus vote for candidates for United States senator: William F. Sheehan 28, Augustus Van Wyck 7, John D. Kernan 4, Francis B. Harrison 1, Joseph A. Goulden 2, James A. Renwick 3, James W. Gerard 2, William Sulzer 3, John B. Stauchfield 1, William B. Ellison 2, Theodore Sitro 1, Isidor Straus 5, Herman Ridder 2, Harry C. Cochran 4, Edward M. Grout 1, Morgan J. O'Brien 2, John J. Gerald 6, Alton B. Parker 1, Victor J. Dowling 1, John A. O'Grorman 1, Edward B. McCall 1, D. Cadmus Herriek 9, Samuel Untermyer 1, John A. Dix 1, John Lynn 1, Total 90.

Ninety Present at Caucus. Thirty of the 116 democratic members of the legislature were present at the caucus. These included a few who have been voting for some other candidate than the caucus nominee, but the bulk of the insurgents were absent.

Several members who have figured as strong advocates of Mr. Sheehan acknowledged in declaring their vote that his election had ceased to be a possibility and that the reconvening of the caucus would be a waste of whatever pledges might have been incurred by attendance upon the first caucus.

Sheehan Advocates Loss Courage. This was the general impression among the Sheehan advocates who expressed the opinion that the ballot-box tomorrow would follow closely the lines of tonight's caucus.

Insurgents Scored. Several of the members in announcing their choice scored the insurgents for their alleged apostasy and vote ardice in failing to attend, but the general tenor of the speeches, even those by Mr. Sheehan, was conciliatory.
