**TAFVILLE**  
 Alexander E. Reeves Returns from Panama—Notes and Personal.

Alexander E. Reeves arrived in town Thursday evening after an absence of about three months, spent in Panama. Mr. Reeves went south on account of ill health and the trip evidently accomplished the desired result as he was brown and evidently enjoying the best of health Thursday evening. He left Panama last Friday and arrived at Sandy Hook Thursday morning, making the trip by boat. He was in the canal zone for a period of about eleven weeks and talks in an entertaining manner of the various points of interest on the canal. According to his observations, Mr. Reeves believes that it will be impossible to complete the canal in the proposed time and also that the cost will be considerably above the figures estimated. Accidental deaths occur frequently at the works and are taken as a matter of course. One day Mr. Reeves saw two men killed. At the Culebra cut progress is slow, as the muck here is frequently and will up the cut almost as fast as the dirt can be removed. Mr. Reeves played second base on the Atlantic team of the Panama league, and William Emerson, alias of Taftville, is catcher for the same team. Mr. Reeves mentioned the palls of mosquito "dope" which line the streets there, and of the heavy fine imposed for meddling with them. During the greater part of his stay at Panama he was located at Christobal, a part of Colon. Mr. Reeves met Joe Carr, former member of the New London baseball team, at Panama, although he found but few other Connecticut men there. Mr. Reeves is well pleased with his trip and says that he enjoyed the finest kind of a time throughout his stay.

**Qualifications Necessary for Licensed County Medical Society.**

At the Wannanahouse at 11 o'clock Thursday morning the 19th annual meeting of the New London County Medical association was held with a good sized attendance.

President P. J. Cassidy of Norwich presided, and made brief opening remarks in his address on "The Medical Profession in the Future." Dr. O. E. Winship of New London, Dr. E. P. Brewer of Norwich read the minutes of the last meeting. Miscellaneous business was transacted. Reports were given among them those of the county reporter, censors, committee on the public health and legislative and special committees.

The complete list of officers elected follows: President, Dr. E. C. Chipman, New London; vice president, Dr. E. P. Brewer, Norwich; clerk, Dr. E. O. Winship, New London; conciliator, Dr. P. J. Cassidy, Norwich; censors, Dr. E. N. Cramm, New London, Dr. C. E. Brayton, Stonington; county reporter, Dr. E. Brophy, Norwich.

There were reports by several committees, including that of the public health committee, which reported that there are two bills before the legislature, one the optometry bill and the other the anti-vaccination bill. The suggestion was made to the legislative committee that the senators and representatives should be seen and request them to oppose the bills.

In addition to the members and delegates there was present William Cunningham of Yale, who represented Yale Medical Journal. This is his senior year at Yale and next year he takes up his hospital duties at Bellevue. He expects to remain for a year or so.

Dr. Shahan's Address.  
 Dr. D. J. Shahan, whose topic was "Where in New London County Should the State Tuberculosis Sanitarium Be Established?" Right here in the station it might be mentioned that the number of births to each 1,000 of the population is less in New London county (22 per cent.) than that of any county in the state; and that for the last 21 years our average death rate from consumption in this county (per 10,000 of population) has been the second lowest in the state (1.59; Middlesex 1.94).

Before determining upon the selection of a spot for the necessary buildings and field treatment, it might be advisedly suggested that we go over the grounds in a somewhat mental perspective, bearing in mind the requirements and holding ourselves in reserve from making any disclosure of place or places, as the state tuberculosis commission has stated that it prefers there be no public declaration of suitable site, as figures on such property should be obtained first to keep the price down.

Believing that the appropriation will be granted, the commissioners have signified their willingness to be guided in the matter of choice by your selection or suggestions.

Among the requirements there should be, first and foremost, an administration building. Lean-tos, or shacks with large verandas, capable of tenantry from 20 to 40 patients each; wards, or infirmaries, for advanced cases; pavilions; nurses' quarters; servants' quarters; and a kitchen.
