PROPOSAL FOR AN INSURRECTION AGENT SENDS MESSAGE TO MEXICAN DEPARTMENT OF FOREIGN RELATIONS

RESULT OF BATTLE AT AGUA PRIETA Proposition Calls Attention to Danger of International Complications Because of Casualties Among Non-Combatant Americans—Indications That Mexican Government Regards Proposal Favorably.

Mexico City, April 18.—A proposition for an armistice pending negotiations for a settlement of Mexico's internal troubles was received by the department of foreign relations today from Washington, presumably from Dr. Vasquez Gomez.

Government Favors Suggestion. A reply was returned in which it was indicated that the government looked with favor upon the suggestion.

Result of Battle at Agua Prieta. The armistice proposal appears to be a direct outgrowth of the battle at Agua Prieta, which resulted in a tactical draw.

Mexican Minister Stipulates Terms. Minister De La Barra, this afternoon sent to Washington the answer to the proposal made by the agent of revolutionists.

Believed Madero Won't Oppose It. So far have negotiations now gone untroubled.

Armies May Cease Operations. It will not surprise some persons if the armies now opposing each other in the north receive orders within the next 48 hours to disengage.

Mexican Minister Retire. Minister De La Barra did not feel at liberty tonight to disclose the contents of the armistice which would be granted.

Gomez Admits Proposal. Washington, April 18.—That proposition for an armistice, have been communicated to Mexico, was admitted tonight by Dr. Vasquez Gomez, head of the confidential agency of the Mexican government.

United States Will Act With Caution. Washington, April 18.—While recognizing the gravity of the situation in Mexico, the United States government is keeping its hands off.

Senator Bacon's Views. Senator Bacon of Georgia, ranking minority member of the foreign relations committee, epitomized the sentiment of the Senate today when he said: "An invasion of Mexico, designed for a limited and temporary purpose, might be like touching a match to a tinder box."

Intervention an Extreme Measure. "Under existing and threatened conditions," he continued, "very great intervention is necessary to prevent broiling this government in a conflict with the Mexican people."

The Situation at Agua Prieta. Agua Prieta, Sonora, Mexico, April 18.—When darkness fell over Agua Prieta tonight it was undetermined whether the federal troops of Lieutenant Colonel Diaz would retain undisputed possession of the city.

Troops Came from Mountain Passes. Watchers were surprised after a day of quietude to see a column of troops of the revolution advance from the mountain passes to the west of Agua Prieta.

Federal's Fire Fell Short. The doubt was soon dispelled. The column began rising rapidly toward the city. Soon gales showed that the revolutionaries were firing their rifles.

Second Column of Rebels Appears. Apparently the approaching rebels were playing in the vicinity of the city. The second column of rebels appeared above the surface.
