**Junior Athletes Record Breakers**  
 Irish-American A. C. Led in Points Scored at Pittsburg  
 —Four Records Broken and Several Equalled—20,000 Spectators.

Pittsburg, June 30.—Junior athletes of America made a glorious record today at Forbes field when four records were broken and several equalled in the first day's meeting of the American Athletic Union junior and senior championship games. In the presence of upwards of 20,000 spectators and with a fast track, perfect field and ideal weather conditions, except for the burning sun, the athletes put forth their best efforts, as the results indicate.

**AN UNEASY FEELING.**  
 Effect of Trust Prosecution Reflected in Stock Movements.

New York, June 30.—Movements of stocks today betrayed the uneasiness which was felt on account of the government's action against wire manufacturers, made known yesterday after the close of the market. Indications of various corporation officials had been foreshadowed in reports in circulation for several days, so that the effect upon the market was lessened.

A considerable loss in cash by the banks indicated a general movement of currency during the week. Bonds were irregular. Total sales, par value, \$1,000,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.
