HARRY LEVINE

Not Located Up to a Late Hour Monday—Mother Nearly Frantic.

The case of little Harry Levine, who has been missing since last Thursday afternoon from Hanover, where he and his mother arrived from New York City for a visit, is exciting local interest. Up to a late hour Monday afternoon no clue as to his whereabouts had been discovered. While the local authorities have no jurisdiction in this particular case, they have been keeping a close lookout for the 4-1/2 year old boy. Sunday afternoon Mrs. Sarah Levine, mother of the missing youngster, came to this city, accompanied by a male relative, and sighted the boy at 91 Columbus street, New York, and were on a visit in Hanover. When she talked with Chief Richmond she was very much relieved if he should change his mind and be given her two or three times to prevent her swooning. Chief Richmond told her he had no jurisdiction in Hanover, or even in Scotland, but that he would do what he could for her and endeavor to locate the boy if he should change his mind here. He advised her to take the matter up with the state police. She left Willimantic with that intention.
