**Sunday School Picnics.** On Tuesday two picnics from the local churches were held at Wildwood park.

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

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**GIRLS INDICTED FOR THE STOKES SHOOTING.** Cases Will Go Over Until October for Trial.

New York, July 18.—Lillian Graham and Ethel Conrad were indicted today on three counts growing out of the shooting of W. E. D. Stokes at the apartment on June 6. The grand jury held them for attempted murder in the first degree, assault in the first degree and assault in the second degree.

The young women will be arraigned tomorrow and after new bail is furnished their cases will go over for trial until October.

It did not take the grand jury long to indict. The case came up this morning and the evidence was brief. The defendants did not appear and the only witnesses were Mr. Stokes and James McCormick, a detective. Stokes repeated the story he had told before the police magistrate, who held the girls for the grand jury.

The trial jury may find the girls guilty on only one or two of three indictments, dismissing the others. Stokes from the first insisted upon pressing the charge of attempted murder.
