DOOIN BREAKS LEG AT ST. LOUIS

Phillie's Manager Out of Game for Season Following Collision in Wednesday's Game—E. P. Larned Wins Tennis Finals—Athletics Win, Tigers Lose.

St. Louis, Mo., July 26.—Manager Doolin of the Philadelphia National baseball team sustained a fracture of his right leg in the game here today. He collided with one of the local club in a close play at the home plate in the fourth inning. He was taken to a hospital.

Physicians at the hospital announced tonight that Doolin hardly will be able to play again this season. Doolin must remain in the hospital until Saturday night at least, when he hopes to be taken to Philadelphia in the presence of the manager's downcast teammates tonight an X-ray photograph was taken of the fracture, which is of the right tibia and about four inches above the ankle. The bone is broken in two places.

The accident occurred in the fourth inning while St. Louis was at bat, and was witnessed by 10,000 or more persons. Third Baseman's Smith had an infield hit. Center Fielder Oakes was a third later Gerler on first. They tried a double steal, and as Shortstop Doolin of Philadelphia returned to the pitcher, Doolin, Oakes slid into the late-foot first striking Doolin with great force. While Umpire O'Day was waving the runner out Doolin dropped on his face. Players of both teams hurriedly carried the manager to a taxicab, which took him to a hospital.

The physicians express opinions that Doolin would be out of the game for at least two months. The manager told his teammates that he believed he would be able to play again in six weeks. Shortstop Michael Doolin will act as manager while Doolin is absent, and Moran and Madden will alternate behind the plate.

This is the third year the Philadelphia team has lost this season in games with St. Louis, and the players said tonight that Doolin's injury may spoil their chances for the pennant. Outfielder John Titus is just rounding into shape after breaking his leg early in the season in a collision in Philadelphia with pitcher Brezina of St. Louis, and Outfielder Sherwood has been suspended for the remainder of the season for striking Umpire Flinneman on St. Louis' last visit to Philadelphia.

In the industrial group, United States Steel was relatively firm, at no time declining more than a fraction. The stock was inclined to place a favorable construction upon yesterday's quarterly report.

International Harvester was one of the weakest of the industrials, receding 2 1/4 points on intimations that the federal government might proceed against the company. The stock displayed strength toward the close however, ending the day with a loss of less than a point.
