MAIN STREET PAVING.

City Ready to Start Work Upon Hearing from Connecticut Company. Alderman Jay M. Shepard, chairman of the street committee, when asked Friday what the city was going to sign its contract with Contractor A. J. Langford for the paving contract on Main street, said: "The committee are all ready to go right ahead with the work just as quick as some assurance can be obtained from the Connecticut company as to when they are going to have their rails in readiness along the stretch of street that is to be paved."

Alderman Shepard also said that he had had a conversation with Superintendent Anderson on Tuesday and that Mr. Anderson had told him that he would communicate with New Haven and telephone Mr. Shepard Wednesday. No word has been received from Mr. Anderson as yet, although it is understood that the railway people have already entered into a contract with Mr. Langford to do the paving between the tracks.

Alderman Shepard said that when the work was once started that it would be completed within the time limit of twenty working days.
