Orders for Oregon.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer, of Seattle, Wash., Saturday, October 7, 1911, says: "The old battleship Oregon, manned by 640 officers and enlisted men, will be ordered to San Pedro, Calif., in command of Capt. C. F. Pond, U. S. N., captain of the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, and commander in chief of the Pacific reserve fleet, to the navy yard. Captain Pond is under the graphic orders to report with his vessel to the commander in chief of the Pacific coast fleet at San Pedro not later than October 30. The Oregon is to undergo an inspection and tests there to ascertain her effectiveness for war duty. Her new control system, wireless apparatus and other modern equipment will be given a thorough inspection."
