**DEPUTY VISITED SOMERSET LODGE**

Deputy Grand Master Justin Holden Also Present—  
Printed Speech Made at the Installation of Officers in 1795 Presented.

The annual visitation of District Deputy C. C. Perkins of New London to Somerset lodge, No. 34, F. and A. M., was made on Wednesday evening, there being an attendance of about 150, the members of St. James' lodge, No. 23, F. and A. M., having been invited. There were many from out of town lodges, these places being represented: New London, Moosup, Montville, Willimantic, Danielson, Colchester, Jewett City, West Haven, Lowell, Lawrence, East Greenwich, R. I., Fairfax, Vt., Long Island City, N. Y., Chester, Pa., and Valley Field, Canada. The entered apprentice degree was worked upon one candidate by Worshipful Master W. H. Woodworth and officers, the Temple quartette being heard in an effective manner during the work and at intermission. Following the work Deputy Perkins addressed the members and in a brief speech complimented the officers for the excellent manner in which the work had been done.

Deputy Grand Master Holden was also heard in commendation of its value, while Rev. F. W. Coleman made a pleasing address concerning the fraternity, speaking in relation to its value and the opportunity it gave to meet so many, which would not be possible otherwise. All were enthusiastically applauded. Secretary C. Leslie Hopkins presented to the lodge in behalf of Past Master George D. Stanton of Asylum lodge, No. 28, of Stonington, a printed pamphlet containing the speech made by Rev. Elhanan Winchester at the installation of the first officers of the lodge, June 24, 1795. It is an interesting document and one much prized by the lodge. Following the work adjournment was taken to the banquet hall, where the tables were spread and the Wauregan house served a fine menu. Miller's orchestra furnished music during the banquet hour.

Jury Out But 25 Minutes in Case of Church vs. Spicer.
