

MASSACHUSETTS REELECTS FOSS

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Massachusetts reelects Foss...
The election was mainly at stake. The democrats successfully defended their old strongholds, the boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx, but by greatly reduced pluralities. Queens county also stood by the democrats, but the republican-fusion candidates made nearly a clean sweep in Brooklyn and probably divided honors in the borough of Richmond.

A year ago Manhattan and the Bronx boroughs gave Governor Dix a plurality of 45,339 and elected a democratic supreme court justice by about 22,000. Today Robert L. Fowler, the democratic candidate for surrogate, carried New York county by a maximum plurality of about 17,000. The democrats elected their candidate for sheriff by about 8,000 and the three democratic candidates for supreme court justice in the First judicial district by a bare 5,000. Francis M. Scott, the fourth justice elected, was endorsed by both parties.

DEMOCRATS GAIN. Governor Wilson's Party May Control New Jersey Senate.

Trenton, N. J., Nov. 7.—Returns of today's election in New Jersey are coming in slowly, but the early returns indicate that the democrats have made a gain in the state senate and may control that body. Democratic senators have been elected in Warren, Salem and Monmouth counties and Democratic State Chairman Grosscup claims that the democrats have elected their candidate for senator in Gloucester county. The republicans do not concede this, but admit that the result is close. With a senator elected from Gloucester county, the democrats would have at least eleven state senators, which would be a majority of the upper house, there being seven held over democratic state senators. Last year's senate was composed of twelve republicans and nine democrats.

Republican Net Gain of Nine. Boston, Nov. 7.—Legislative returns tabulated up to midnight indicate that the republicans had lost one seat in the state senate, but had gained ten places in the house.

MARYLAND IN DOUBT. Republicans Claim Election of Goldsborough by 5,000. Baltimore, Nov. 7.—Up to eleven o'clock, the returns from today's gubernatorial election in Maryland were so meagre that anything like a definite forecast of the result of the balloting would have been the purest guesswork. At that hour but ten of the 321 precincts in Baltimore city had been heard from, showing slight republican gain and nothing of a definite character had been received from the counties.

Based on the information at hand, the republicans were claiming the election of Phillips Lee Goldsborough, their nominee for governor, over his democratic opponent, Arthur P. Gorman, by a 5,000 majority. On their part, the democratic managers were insisting that their candidate would be returned by a safe margin.

A Republican Mayor at Auburn. Austin, N. Y., Nov. 7.—Thomas E. O'Neill, republican, has been re-elected mayor, defeating Thomas M. Osborne, democrat, by 583.

Concord Re-elects Mayor French. Concord, N. H., Nov. 7.—Charles J. French, a granite cutter, was elected today for the third time mayor of Concord, receiving 2,239 votes to 1,469 for Elmer H. Farrar. Under the present city charter municipal elections are non-partisan, no party designations appearing on the official ballot.

WILSON AT BRIDGEPORT. Republican Candidate for Mayor Wins by Plurality of 280. Bridgeport, Conn., Nov. 7.—By a vote of 5,611 Clifford B. Wilson, republican, was elected mayor of this city at today's election. John M. Donnelly, his democratic opponent, received 5,331, and James McLevy, socialist, 5,425 votes. S. E. Boucher, democrat, was re-elected city clerk by a majority of 140. P. W. Hall, democrat, was re-elected city treasurer by 422. R. E. Cooney, republican, was elected tax collector \$12 majority; and W. Thomas, democrat, was re-elected town clerk by a majority of 153.

Of the councilmen, the socialists elected their candidate in the Twelfth district, and of the remaining eleven the democrats elected seven and the republicans four. The next council will stand four democrats, nine republicans and one socialist.

BIG SOCIALIST VICTORY. Elect Mayor and All But One City Officer at Schenectady. Schenectady, N. Y., Nov. 7.—For the first time in the history of this county the socialists have polled a majority, electing a mayor, all but one city officer and probably the county board of supervisors socialist. Rev. Dr. George R. Lunn, pastor of the United People's church and editor of The Citizen, a socialist weekly, was elected mayor by a plurality of 1,939, or practically two-thirds of the total vote polled. The republicans elected a city judge by a plurality of less than 50 votes, but this was the result of no socialist candidate being nominated. Early returns indicate that Herbert M. Merrill, socialist, will represent this county in the assembly. He carried the city by a plurality of about 1,000.

Dr. Lunn began his career here as pastor of the First Reformed church, and one of the first socialists, but he was compelled to resign this pastorate because of his socialist preaching and then organized the United People's congregation, which has recently united with the First Congregationalist with Dr. Lunn as pastor.

TOM JOHNSON'S "HEIR." Newton D. Baker, Democrat, Elected Mayor of Cleveland. Cleveland, O., Nov. 7.—Cleveland, which two years ago went republican, electing Herman C. Baehr mayor over the late Tom L. Johnson, returned to the democratic fold today by electing Newton D. Baker, Johnson's political heir, mayor over Frank C. Hogan, republican, by about 18,000 majority.

The entire democratic city ticket won with the exception of five councilmen. Mr. Baker, the new mayor, was city solicitor during the entire eight year of the Johnson regime and was elected two years ago when the rest of the democratic ticket was defeated. The heavy annual votes for women and is pledged for all progressive issues. In his campaign he declared for a municipal lighting plant, for municipal betterment generally and all the issues for which Johnson stood.

Judge Loses His Own County. Mount Sterling, Ky., Nov. 7.—Judge Edward C. O'Rear of Mount Sterling, republican candidate for governor, has lost this county's county seat to his own home, by about 400, according to the figures of the republican organization.

Bridgeport.—Five new members of the Bridgeport Poultry, Pigeon and Pigeon Stock association were elected at a recent meeting, when final plans were made for the big show to be held in the Lincoln building, December 5, 6 and 7.

EXPENSES \$85,472.30. Estimate for Coming Year by Appropriations Committee.

Willimantic, Nov. 7.—The appropriations committee of the board of aldermen, comprising Aldermen Chase, Whitmore and Tew, met Tuesday evening and invited the mayor to meet with them, making the following estimates for the next fiscal year, to be submitted to the board for approval at its next meeting and later to the city meeting for ratification: Fire department \$4,000; an increase police department \$3,500; streets \$12,000; improvement of streets \$5,000; lights \$11,000; a decrease of \$500; library \$1,000; interest \$5,000; sewer construction \$8,000; water department \$4,000; contingent fund \$4,000; a decrease of \$500; rents \$500; maintaining sewers \$1,500; collecting taxes and assessments \$1,000; footbridge \$200; police court \$1,800; printing and advertising \$500; garbage \$1,200; testing lights \$500; trap rock \$1,800; new streets \$300; sidewalks \$5,000; an increase of \$1,000; spraying and oiling \$1,200; election expenses \$700; special Main street construction \$274.94; special sewer construction \$37.55; total \$85,472.30, against \$83,800 one year ago.
