On Monday evening there was an adjourned meeting of the court of common council for the purpose of giving a hearing on the location of the track for the extension of the Connecticut company's line from a point in Shetucket street opposite Laurel Hill avenue to a point near the freight yard of the New Haven road, near the foot of Market street.

The season was called to order at 8 o'clock, with Mayor Thayer presiding and the following present: Councilmen Gehrb, Parker and Beckley, Councilmen Lang, Fowler and Williams.

At the opening Mayor Thayer called attention to the fact that the only matter before the council was the hearing on the extension, and stated that he should not be present for the entire session.
