MILE RUN AND WEIGHT NEW RECORDS ALLOWED. To Jones of Cornell and Mat McGrath—A. A. U. Elects Officers. New York, Nov. 20.—Gustavus T. Kirby of New York, chairman of the executive committee of the Intercollegiate Athletic Association, today elected president of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States. He defeated George F. Pawling of Philadelphia, president of the athletic association, by a vote of 22 to 6. The election took place at the 24th annual meeting of the A. A. U., which convened here today with 1000 in attendance from all parts of the country. Mr. Kirby will succeed Everett C. Brown of Chicago. James Sullivan was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

In his annual report Everett C. Brown, retiring president, said the union was growing in strength despite the attacks of anti-sports critics in this country and jealous rivals in other countries. Mr. Brown said that the team to represent the United States at the Olympic games in 1912 would be the best the country had ever sent abroad. The report recommended Chicago as the natural place for all round championship meets because the number of entries in these events in that city in the last two years had exceeded that of any other city. The championships have been contested in Philadelphia, New York, and Chicago.

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL.

TRADING FALLS OFF. Yesterday Afternoon's Session the Dullest for Several Weeks.

New York, Nov. 20.—Trading fell off abruptly today on the stock exchange. The afternoon session was the dullest of several years and the total of transactions was considerably below the recent average. The market seemed to be waiting irresolutely for some new impetus to determine its course. After its recovery of more than half of the losses sustained during the long summer decline, quotations rose and fell within a narrow range until the afternoon of the day, when the market became weak, and some of the principal stocks including United States Steel, Union Pacific, Northern Pacific and Great Northern preferred, lost a point or more. General reactions of American stocks in London exercised a depressing effect which was heightened by the selling of United States Steel in the early trading, and a further break in the Washish stocks and bonds. Bear operators concentrated their attack on United States Steel ostensibly because of the meeting of the Stanley committee for resumption of the steel investigation. The whole list fell, but losses were small and the bears were not permitted to have the advantage for long. Stocks were absorbed so readily that the list held steadily after the first break. Pressure diminished and the market began to gather strength. A few stocks, including Reading, some of the copper issues and a number of southern stocks rose from one to two points above Saturday's close. These gains in the main were superficial when the market sold off late in the day. The demand for small unquoted Copper and Utah Copper, which made them conspicuously strong during the morning, was based largely upon continued reports of trade conditions. Some sellers today quote the metal at 13 cents.

The curb, American Tobacco rose fifteen points to 46 1/2, its highest price since the decree of the United States supreme court was rendered against the company. The export movement of gold continued today, \$1,300,000 being engaged for shipment to Canada, and \$1,000,000 for South America. The total thus far engaged for Canada was brought up to \$7,050,000 and for South America \$1,550,000. In addition to these amounts \$2,600,000 was shipped to San Francisco today, making a total loss of gold of about \$1,000,000 in the last few days. Despite the extent of this movement there was no tightening of money rates, and bankers were of the opinion that in view of the improvement in financial and political affairs abroad and the conditions at home, the market might remain easy for some time. Several large orders for equipment were placed by the railroads and other companies, and some of the equipment companies were running their plants at nearer capacity rate than at any previous time this year. Invoices for the quarter ended last month value, \$2,808,000. Total sales par bonds unchanged on call.
