EVERY WARD FOR DUNN.

Willimantic's Mayor Re-elected for the Fourth Successive Term—Majority of 264—Democrats Elect Their Entire City Ticket—Control Board of Aldermen.

The biennial city election was held in Willimantic Monday and Daniel P. Dunn, candidate for the fourth successive term for mayor, was elected by the overwhelming majority of 264, carrying every ward in the city.

The democrats also have elected the entire city ticket from top to bottom, two of the three aldermen at large and aldermen in the First and Third wards, thus securing control of the board by 4-3. The contest for alderman in the Fourth ward was very close, William E. Clark defeating Jean J. Oldershaw, the democratic candidate, by only seven votes. Frank R. Jackson, republican, won in the Second ward over Leo L. Thompson, democrat, by 39 votes, which is 14 votes more than Jay M. Shepard secured in 1909.

The surprise of the election was the big change in the First ward. Two years ago C. C. Case, republican, carried the ward by 26 majority, while this year David E. Ahern, democrat, carried the ward by 28 votes.

In the Third ward D. B. O'Connor, democrat, had a majority of 141 over his opponent and the larger majority than two years ago, when the somewhat light vote cast there this year is taken into consideration.

City Clerk and Treasurer A. C. Scripture was returned a winner by exactly the same total majority as Mayor Dunn, 264, against a majority of 214 two years ago against his same republican opponent, John B. Edgarton.

E. L. Powell, republican candidate for city sheriff, defeated Robert O. Snow in the Second ward by one vote and by six votes in the Fourth ward, but the latter had a majority of 49 votes in the First ward and a majority of 165 in the Third ward, making his total majority 207 against a majority of 73 over Marvin W. Hall two years ago.

The polls were opened promptly in all wards at 7 o'clock and closed at 4 o'clock. The day was clear and bright during the day, but the weather was very close, and the vote was kept up until the close of the polls.

City ward committees were hard at work all day, but the much talked of "boosters" did not seem to have the requisite power to boost as predicted and therefore the democrats were fully elated as well as not a few republicans who accorded the democratic nominees many votes, as will appear by the various tabulations in the several wards.

That "Danny" Dunn was again wanted for mayor cannot be disputed. The first ward, where the board there can be no complaint in many quarters. The sad defeat of the republicans generally is nothing to be surprised at, and the voters of their own party early in the day.

The Second ward was the first ward to be heard from, the Third the next. The First ward at 8:10 o'clock, when the various ward moderators reported to him.

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COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Complete Annual Report for Middlesex County.

The county commissioners of Middlesex county have just completed their annual report for the fiscal year ended October 1, 1911. During the year in the city of Middletown there were 3 wholesale liquor licenses issued, 34 straight liquor licenses and 9 drugist licenses. \$16,600 was received as revenue from the above licenses, of which \$14,100 was paid over to the town treasurer and \$2,500 to the city treasurer for the police benefit fund. In the entire county four wholesale licenses were issued, 43 retail licenses, 11 drugist licenses and 8 drugist prescription licenses. The revenue from the sources totals \$21,277.34. The amount turned over to the various town treasurers, including the contribution of \$820 toward the police benefit fund of Middletown, is \$19,194.60.
