SHOULD HAVE TOOLS. Every woman in charge of a household should provide herself with a small collection of tools. A hammer, gimlet, small hand saw, screwdriver and pliers will probably be sufficient. More tools can be added when the occasion demands. Tacks, nails and screws of assorted sizes, sandpaper, a tube of furniture glue and a can of oil will also be needed. If a box with this outfit is kept conveniently at hand the smaller repairs about the house can be undertaken by the housekeeper herself, and let it be remembered that it is as important for these little jobs to receive immediate attention as the proverbial "stitch in time."

Simple upholstery is not difficult, and should also come within a woman's province. With a little practice very satisfactory work can be accomplished. Pretty materials for this purpose can be purchased for a nominal price, and with some work a room can be kept fresh and bright at a very small outlay.

BEEF STEW WITH DUMPLINGS. Take two pounds of the neck of beef, two onions, six large potatoes, two quarts of water, two teaspoonsfuls of flour. Cut the beef in nine pieces. Put about half of the fat in the stew pan with the onions and stir for eight or ten minutes over a hot fire; then put in the meat and sprinkle with the flour a teaspoonful of salt and a quarter teaspoonful of pepper. Stir ten minutes and add the water, boiling. Simmer for an hour and a half, then

add the potatoes peeled and cut in quarters; simmer a half hour longer, then add the dumplings. For the dumplings take one pint of flour, one teaspoonful of baking powder, a quarter teaspoonful of salt. Mix all thoroughly and wet with a small cupful of milk. Stir into a smooth ball, sprinkle a little flour on the board and turn the dough onto it, roll to the thickness of half an inch and cut in small cakes.
