TY COBB'S WIGGLE. BOB BESCHER'S BULK. Baseman Fear Them Both—Cobb Has Greater Base Stealer.

Ty Cobb of the Detroit Tigers stole eighty-three bases this year; Bob Beschler of the Cincinnati Reds stole eighty. In these two baseball fields the greatest base runners at least as far as figures go, Josh Devore of the New York Giants and Clyde Milne of the Washington Nationals had fifty-eight.

Cobb and Beschler differ in size and style. Cobb is the more powerful, and usually the greater. Cobb depends on his speed, agility and cunning; Beschler on his strength.

In 1911 Beschler stole in seven more games than Cobb. A member of a team there are not five pitchers who give or the first two months of the season, Beschler had the opportunity to run wild.

Base running with Cobb, like batting, is a science. Cobb has been successful in practicing sliding. Cobb slides when the occasion does not call for it.

The pitcher and catcher figure prominently in Cobb's method. He has studied every characteristic movement of each individual pitcher.

Outguessing the catcher is another feature of Cobb's method. He studies catchers as carefully as pitchers. He tries to figure what they expect.

Basemen fear the wiggling Cobb and the bulk of Beschler. He can slip and take a wonderfully quick arm to do an infielder out.
